On Saturday afternoon, May's family celebrated with an afternoon tea at Edale, where she was joined by three of her children - Bruce, Peter and Diane, as well as five of her grandchildren and their partners. May's daughter Diane Donald says, "Mum was delighted that Andy and Beth made time to personally deliver the beautiful flowers for her; on her special day."

May is the granddaughter of one of Marton's earliest settlers, Robert Signal. He bought the first subdivided property in the Tutaenui block, which later became Marton 150 years ago this year.

May has seen monumental leaps in technology in 105 years and, being born in 1914, lived through two world wars, as well as the Great Depression of the 1930s.

The Ark - a home shared with those in need

A generous Marton man has offered his home to the community for use as an emergency home, for people in need.

There is no other such house available in Marton so his generosity will provide rooms for families in need who will be referred by local support groups.

Alan Relf found himself living alone in a central Marton home of 14 years when his wife left. He could not see the point of living on his own and being a Christian, it occurred to him to share his home. He saw Belinda Harvey Larsen from Get n' Give and offered his big house to share with anyone she knew who needed somewhere to stay. From there the idea grew and grew.

Alan says, "It's like in the Bible when Noah was called to build the ark. We will call this house The Ark. We will build it up to keep families safe, then they can make a new start again. It will be an oasis for people and give them time out and enable them to get started again."

Alan, A farm worker, says he willhave exclusive use of one bedroom and live in the house full time. He says, "I pray every day for God to bless the house and make it safe and (like the loaves and fishes a parable) the blessings are multiplyin . He says so far it has been very interesting.

The Get n 'Give Trust has insulated the house added a sunroom, set up rooms for families and done work painting and improving. PD workers have already put up a back fence but there is a great deal more to do. The dwelling has two toilets and four bedrooms and needs painting inside and out.

Belinda Harvey Larsen says, "We are keeping the location of the home private to protect those who need to use it. Donations of basics items a family would need, like soap or toothpaste or homemade jams would be very gratefully received, as well as a monetary donations. They can be left at Go Ahead Hair Salon or Property Brokers in Broadway. The trust has already received a load of firewood. The house will provide rooms for families who will be referred by social support agencies.

AT THE COUNCIL



Marton development was a key theme at the Council meeting last week.

To cope with increasing demand for industrial and residentialzoned land in the Marton area, Council is planning to rezone two areas on the edges of town. A residential zone is proposed at the western end of town, between Wanganui Rd and Johnston Rd, but not including Huntley School. On the other side of town, the area between Wings Line and Makirikiri Rd, running from town to SH1, is proposed for industrial zoning. At the same time, it's been suggested that the minimum plot size in the Rural Living zone should be reduced from 2ha to 0.5ha. There will be a formal consultation for these changes. A planned 87-lot residential subdivision is a step closer, with the approval of a development agreement. The subdivision will be on the corner of Hereford St and Bredins Line, and Council will take responsibility for designing and building the new intersection needed. Council is also waiving the "internal costs" for processing subdivision consents.

New 24/7 toilets are on the way for Follett St in Marton and quite a bit of time last week was spent discussing adding artwork to the original design, to make them more attractive. The design changes will add almost \$26,000 to the cost of the toilets

Eight properties that were "abandoned" (no rates paid for three years or more) have been sold and another one is on the market. Seven properties didn't make enough to cover the outstanding debts, so those have been written off. One property covered its debt, and the surplus has been transferred to Public Trust.

Better Māori land info for owners

The launch of the upgraded WhenuaViz website, marks an important milestone in the rollout of the new Whenua Māori programme.

Māori Development Minister Nanaia Mahuta announced the cross-government programme in February. The Whenua Māori programme, co-led by Te Puni Kōkiri and the Ministry of Justice, aims to stimulate new opportunities for whānau to realise their aspirations for Māori freehold

One of the key initiatives is the development of a Whenua knowledge hub. This will be a standalone website, providing a wealth of information, digital tools and maps for Māori land owners, on all aspects of whenua development, from succession through to growth opportunities.

"We're keen to ensure Māori land owners have access to the best support and knowledge about their whenua, so they can make informed decisions", says Te Puni Kōkiri toihautū Michelle Hippolite.

She says the upgrade of the WhenuaViz website in partnership with Manaaki Whenua-Landcare Research is an important first step in for future collaboration. It will be simpler for whānau to generate customised land summary reports including information about soil properties, climate and potential uses for individual land blocks. There is also a short video guide to help whānau navigate the site. GM Māori partnerships, Holden Hohaia of Manaaki Whenua says, "Knowledge is power and the WhenuaViz website holds some valuable information for Māori land owners who want to sustainably use their land." NZEI and PPTA ballot members on joint strike action

NZEI Te Riu Roa and the Post Primary Teachers' Association (PPTA) are balloting members this week on whether to take joint strike action on 29 May.

Primary teacher and principal members of NZEI Te Riu Roa are voting at a series of paid union meetings from 6-10 May and secondary school members of PPTA will vote in an online ballot throughout the same period.

PPTA president Jack Boyle says, "2019 is the year the government needs to deliver for children, for teachers and for education. For New Zealand to be the 'best place to be a child' we need a well-supported, well-resourced and trusted teaching profession in all our schools and communities.

"The offers we have received from the government do not address the issues our profession faces. We wonder what it will take for the government to listen to us, acknowledge the truth, and act?"

NZEI Te Riu Roa's president Lynda Stewart says she is disappointed the government failed to improve their offer to primary teachers and principals in negotiations earlier this week but that the prospect of a joint strike with secondary teachers will give primary teachers and principals strength. The outcome of both unions' ballots will be announced early in the week of 13 May.

A lifetime of shearing with whanau

Fish (Paiaka) Maraku turned 90 on Monday May 6. He will celebrate the occasion at Tokorangi Marae on Saturday with his many children and descendants including great, great, great grandchildren, as well as whanau and a lifetime of friends.

Fish got his name because his parents owned a fish n' chip shop on Heretaunga St in Hastings where Fish was born. "My biological father was Lebanese and my mother was Maori. He was killed in the 1931 Hawkes Bay -Napier earthquake when the shop, made of bricks, fell down and crushed him. Everyone just called me Fish."

He thinks he must have been a survivor of the earthquake and as a two year old child and afterwards, his biological mother Rangimaria Kite, took him to Tahupotiki Wiremu Ratana, a Methodist Maori farmer who was seen as a visionary and faith healer, where lots of people who had suffered in disasters or had health problems went to be healed. Fish can remember the prophet Ratana sitting on the step watching him and other children play and he remembers a building covered with discarded, crutches, walking sticks, old wheel chairs and braces for the infirm. The roof was adorned in them and us kids called it the boogie house. Not knowing its significance at the time." Fish was raised by his biological grandmother Mero Kite until

her passing. At the age of nine he was a whangai (adopted) child of Kehu and Amiria Maraku with whom he remained with and acknowledged as his parents, until their passing, when he was in his 20's and already had whanau of his own.

Fish is most likely the longest serving shearing contractor in New Zealand at 90. The family contract still bears his name and he still signs the cheques. "He's still he boss, "says his son Lawrence Maraku, the current Maraku Shearing contract manager. Fish started his 74 year long shearing career at about 16 years old; working for Dick Ashford. Eventually Dick gifted him a few sheds and later on he went into partnership with a shearer, Bill Williams, for ten years. Then Bill left for Wellington and Maraku Shearing began its fine tradition of six or so decades (to date) of shearing throughout Wanganui and Rangitikei districts.

Fish says he loves the challenge and loves shearing. "With shearing gangs, you always have someone coming to take you on. I loved the competition. You had to push yourself against others, not like a job working for the council," he says. He last shore a sheep just eight years ago and still visits the contract location.

In the off season, he worked at Imlay (now Affco) and as a porter at the Jubilee Home. In the weekend, I would bike home to Otoko to enjoy one of my favourite activities, pig hunting." He played rugby for Ratana and for Wanganui a couple of times and was selected for the Maori All Blacks but missed out after he broke his leg in a bike accident. He also has a passion for gambling. He began his job with family and family has been an integral

part of his life. At one point, nearly everyone in the shearing gang was a member of his the Maraku family. The gang is still old school too. It is one of the few in NZ to work from 5am to 5pm during the season. Thousands of shearers have been trained by, or worked for, the Maraku's and many are lifelong friends.

Fish has lived in Ratana, Otoko, Hunterville and Marton during his life and is always surrounded by his n umerous whanau. All of his families are close and enjoy time with him and each other. Currently, he lives with his daughter in Main St in Marton and says he has been blessed with good health all his life -maybe with a little help Shearing his last sheep at Morikau shed from the Prophet Ratana.

Next stage of Annual Plan consultation

Submissions closed on 1 May 2019. Those submitters who asked to speak to Council about their ideas or concerns will be doing this in Marton on 9 May and in Taihape on 10 May. Council will consider all submissions at its meeting on 30 May, after which the final Annual Plan will be prepared for adoption on 27 June.

Council appreciates the effort taken by those people who came to the various public meetings and who made submissions.

Mangaweka Bridge

A number of people used the Annual Plan submission process to express their desire to see the current, century-old Mangaweka Bridge remain after the new bridge is completed and open. This is a shared bridge with Manawatū District Council (meaning costs not funded by the New Zealand Transport Agency are shared equally). A joint workshop for the two councils will be proposed once the economic analysis is completed, expected early June.

Heritage New Zealand has advised it is unable to consider inclusion of the bridge on its list before 2020/21.

Marton's new 24/7 toilet in Follett Street

The Marton Community Committee suggested that the new toilets (to be built within the next few months) could be visually more attractive with the

addition of a gable roof and exterior colours which picked up the newly adopted brand. At its meeting on 2 May, Council agreed.

District Plan change

To meet demand for additional industrial and residential land in Marton, Council is initiating a District Plan change. This will propose changes to some areas of land currently classified as rural. At the same time, it is intended to propose the reduction of the minimum lot size in the rural living zone from two hectares to half a hectare. This change acknowledges interest in having smaller blocks and is in line with similar zoning in other districts.

There will be public consultation on these proposed changes.

Grant approvals

At its meeting on 2 May 2019, the Finance/ Performance Committee made decisions on applications for the Council-funded Community Initiatives Fund and the Events Sponsorship Scheme. The successful applicants were: Bulls and Districts Historical Society, Bulls Junior Rugby Club, Marton & District Historical Society, Marton Country Music Festival, Marton Golf Club, Marton Music Society, Project Marton, Rangitikei Branch of the Royal Forest and Bird Protection Society, St Andrews Presbyterian Church (Marton), South Makirikiri School, Sport Whanganui, Taihape Community Development Trust, Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Hinemanu me Ngāti Paki ki Mōkai Pātea, Wanganui Area Neighbourhood Support Group, and Whanganui Safe and Free Inc.

Residents' survey

Every household should have received a postcard with details of this year's annual residents' survey. It includes a link to the Council website where you can do it online. However, if you prefer to write on a printed copy and post it or hand it in, please phone 0800 422 522.

The closing date for completed surveys is 19 May. Your views are important for helping us improve our services and facilities.

Adoption of Maori Language Commission orthography

Following consideration by Te Roopu Ahi Kaa, at its meeting on 2 May 2019, Council approved the adoption of the Māori Language Commission's orthography for all its reports, publications and signage. This mean using the macron – such as in Rangitīkei. In addition, Council will propose to the New Zealand Geographic Board that the Council's name be changed to include the macron.

Chief Executive recruitment process

The Local Government Act requires Council to advertise the role of Chief Executive no later than seven years after appointment, irrespective of whether the current incumbent wishes to continue. Council has taken steps to initiate this process.

Taihape farmer banned from owning animals

A Taihape farmer has been banned from owning, exercising authority over, or being in charge of any farm animals for five years after the deaths of dozens of ewes on his farm.

Sixty-five-year-old William (Bill) Chase earlier pleaded guilty to four charges under the Animal Welfare Act, including two charges of reckless ill-treatment of an animal, resulting in the animal's death, when he was sentenced in the Palmerston District Court last week.

He was also ordered to serve three months community detention.

When Ministry for Primary Industries animal welfare inspectors responded to a complaint about the welfare of his animals in August 2017, they found 30 ewes in various states of decomposition as well as dying ewes, 22 of which were so emaciated they had to be euthanised to end their suffering.

One third (100) of the remaining ewes on the property were assessed by a veterinarian as having a body condition score of 1 or less. The Code of Welfare governing sheep and beef cattle requires that urgent remedial action must be taken to improve the condition of any animal in this state, or the animal must be destroyed humanely.

MPI'smanager of animal welfare compliance Gray Harrison says the scene that greeted the MPI animal welfare

inspectors was extremely unpleasant.

"It was obvious Mr Chase had shown a complete lack of animal husbandry and supervision including a failure to provide enough food for the ewes in his care and failing to shear, crutch, dag and drench them," says Mr Harrison."This situation could've been avoided if Mr Chase had supervised and looked after his animals

"The Animal Welfare Act imposes a duty of care on owners and people in charge of animals, to meet their animals' physical, health and behavioural needs and to provide treatment that alleviates pain and distress suffered by any ill or injured animals. The Code of Welfare for sheep and beef cattle expands on the requirements of the Act. Sheep need to be checked regularly, but even more closely when they are fully-fleeced, close to lambing and in poor condition, so that remedial action can be taken if necessary.

Chases's care was totally unacceptable. We never find these sorts of cases easy but we always ensure we take the appropriate action to penalise people who treat animals this way." MPI animal welfare complaints

At the same time, we have had no reports from any of our 12 regions of any prohibited firearms being seized, he says. He says it's likely, however, there will be prosecutions for breaches such as not carrying a hunting licence and banned use of lead shot near water.






