

# Treemendous turnout to planting

Over 90 people turned up at Clifton School on Saturday morning to join the Treemendous Project to plant an outdoor classroom sponsored by Mazda.

The Mazda Foundation and the Project Crimson Trust launched Treemendous in 2007. Four NZ schools are chosen each year to have an area of their grounds turned into an outdoor classroom and so far, 40 schools have benefited. It's a prize worth \$10,000 and all primary and intermediate schools can apply. The initiative is about encouraging environmental awareness in schools and the wider community about the importance of caring for the environment.

Clifton School principal Adrian Burn says, "It's wonderful for the school and for the kids. The community is out - all pitching in on the project. I'm sure it's going to be wonderful when it's finished. It will be a great resource."

Chair of the Mazda Foundation and chief executive of Mazda NZ, David Hodge said, "We're proud to fund the project with the help of Project Crimson and the school provides labour.We book a barbecue (for the project workers) and enlist help from the local Mazda dealers; in this case Palmfeild Motors, who also helped digging holes. We enjoy the project and the community feels good about it. It's soft exposure for Mazda. We give up four weekends a year which gets us into the community."

Nathan Baish, a teacher aide at Clifton School was overseeing the work on Saturday morning. He has a gardening background and his relation, Craig Martin designed the outdoor classroom space, which includes two octagon spaces and paths. Nathan says it took all day to lay the plants out on Friday ready for planting and in time for the Treemendous crew to arrive.

All of the plants are native, designed to attract beneficial bees and insects. Ruud Kleinpaste, the 'Bugman', is an ambassador for the project.

# RSA Poppy Appeal shines light on veteran mental health



The theme for this year's RSA Poppy Appeal, not all wounds bleed - highlights the fact that mental health injuries are the most common, but least understood, of all

wounds suffered by NZ servicemen and women. The appeal, which raises vital funds to support the growing needs of New Zealand's 41,000 veterans and their families, was officially launched in Auckland this week and will culminate in Poppy Day on Friday April 20. Post-traumatic stress injuries take a heavy toll on veteran's

health. RSA National President BJ Clark said the RSA was committed to providing a wide range of help to former members of the military who have served in deployments around the world.

"There's a growing demand for our support services, including an increasing number with service-induced mental health injuries. These are best described as any persistent psychological difficulty resulting from duties. 'These injuries may occur because of exposure to trauma or stress arising from combat, operational duties in a conflict zone, or other traumatic or serious events such as civil defence emergency or disaster relief," Mr Clark said. NZ Defence Force medical director Dr Paul Nealis said stress injuries occur along a spectrum, ending with the most severe wound - post traumatic stress injury (PTSI). "Symptoms of PTSI include reliving the event, including nightmares, flashbacks, or intrusive thoughts. In addition, sufferers can experience avoiding thoughts; feelings, or situations that serve as reminders of the event; feeling numb or cut off from others; being easily startled and being vigilant for signs of danger," Dr Nealis said.

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# Beat the cold snap

Winter is coming with the first cold snap hitting the country but you can make your home cosier with some simple, quick DIY according to EECA Enerywise.

The sate agency say prioritising cleaning the filters on your heat pump or dehumidifier so it runs properly. Technical expert Christian Hoerning says heat pump filters should ideally be cleaned every few weeks during winter because they can get clogged.

If you own a dehumidifier, run it while you are heating the room. "Dehumidifiers work best in warm rooms and all the electricity they use gets released as heat - so your heater needs to do less work."

If the cold draughts are whistling through your home, he suggests putting low-cost draught stopping tape around windows or doors and tightening up the hinges on doors and windows.

He says it's important to avoid lots of moisture in the home over winter because it increases the risk of mould. Air your home by opening windows and doors a few times a day, even in winter, he says.

Other top tips: dry clothes outside or in a clothes dryer that is vented to the outside – avoid indoor airing racks or clothes dryers that vent into your house. The moisture in the clothes will end up in your home, making it damp. Avoid unflued gas heaters which release toxic fumes and make your house damp. Cheap portable electric heaters are safer and cost less to run. Check your insulation to make sure it is up to scratch and hasn't been moved over the summer.

# HEALTH SCENE WDHB asks how safe is

**your home?** To mark April Falls Month, Whanganui District Health Board is urging Whanganui residents to ask themselves how safe

their home is, given that many things we look at every day could be potential hazards that lead to a fall. WDHB director of nursing and patient safety and quality general manager Sandy Blake says "while the risk of falling

general manager Sandy Blake says "while the risk of falling increases with age, the good news is – we can all do something about it.

"I suggest we sit down with a family member or friend and go through the easy room-by-room checklist of your home and garden, which ACC has produced," Mrs Blake says. "You will find it on their website by going to http://ow.ly/ MKLN30jk84q.

"Remember to make a note of anything that might need to be fixed or changed. If you're still unsure about what needs to be done, ask family, friends or your health professional for advice."

The checklist asks questions such as:

Do your carpets or rugs lie flat, -without frayed corners or rolled up edges?

Are your rugs non-slip (with a rubber back) or secured to the floor?

Is the furniture arranged to provide clear walkways? Are all your walkways clear of clutter (e.g. newspapers,

boxes, shoes)? Are electrical cords and wires kept away from walkways or taped down?

Is your lounge chair easy to get out of?

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# Riskiest Takata airbags recall good for consumers

The compulsory recall of more than 50,000 vehicles fitted with potentially explosive Takata airbags will provide clarity, Consumer NZ head of testing Paul Smith says. Manufacturers and importers have 18 months to make repairs on affected vehicles.

"The recall was previously voluntary, covering about 452,000 vehicles, with more than 307,000 yet to be fixed. That's a poor return for a recall ongoing for almost five years.'

The compulsory recall applies to vehicles fitted with older "alpha" generation airbags, while the remaining vehicles remain under voluntary recall."

Dr Paul Smith said: "Making the recall compulsory will provide clarity for consumers over whether their car is affected and reassure them that the riskiest airbags are being prioritised. It sends a clear message to the industry they haven't been acting swiftly enough to protect Kiwi motorists."

"Not all Takata airbags will explode on deployment, in fact it's unlikely – a one in 400 risk, is reported globally. But the older 'alpha' airbags, fitted to cars manufactured between 2001 and 2006, are more dangerous – tests have shown there's a chance every other deployment could be explosive."

The compulsory recall makes manufacturers and importers responsible for the fix and sets a timeline of 18 months to repair all vehicles fitted with "alpha" airbags. It also prohibits further import of vehicles with these airbags. Consumer NZ advises owners of cars manufactured between 2001 and 2006, to contact the manufacturer (for NZ-new cars) or importer (for used-imports) – don't wait for a letter to arrive. It can be difficult to track down the importer, so go to the dealer you bought the car from – they should be able to help and might even be the importer.

The lists are always being updated, as more makes and models are implicated, so keep checking. If your car is on the recall list, the manufacturer will

contact you by letter.

If you haven't been contacted, or you are concerned your car is part of the recall, contact the local dealer for the brand of your car (if it was sold NZ-new) or the importer (if it was a used-import) for advice.

If you are contacted by the manufacturer or importer, take your car in and get it fixed. It won't cost you anything.

Horizons Regional Council is calling for applications to its community grants programme - with \$20,000 available to support environmental initiatives.

The programme helps encourage and support local community groups, schools, early childcare centres and iwi/hapū, with not-forprofit projects designed to enhance the region's natural environment.

Horizons chair Bruce Gordon says applications will be assessed on environmental benefits, feasibility, community involvement and long-term benefits.

"In the past we have granted funding to a range of projects such as sand dune restoration, native tree planting, wetland preservation and trapping to protect endangered species," says Mr Gordon.

"More often than not we help groups that simply need a little funding to get their projects underway. It's really satisfying to provide this support and we also supply expert advice where possible."

Mr Gordon says applications that provide opportunities for the public to learn more about the environment and encourage greater use of the region's facilities and amenities will be considered favourably.

"We receive frequent proposals for beautification planting, vegetable gardens and edible forests. While these are great ideas, they don't focus on engagement with the natural environmental aspect of the programme, so we ask that applicants have a decent read of the grant guidelines."

Last year, Horizons funded 12 projects across the region and each of which received between \$200 - \$3,050 each.

## BOWEL SCREENING

We are pleased to report that Whanganui District Health Board is on schedule to implement the National Bowel Screening Programme in mid-2019.

Achieving equity in screening rates for Māori, Pacifica, people living in socioeconomically-deprived areas and rural populations is a high priority for Whanganui DHB and the National Bowel Screening Programme.

Key points to remember are:

- adults in the 60–74 age group are eligible to participate
- participation in the programme is free
- eligible men and women will be invited to participate every two years
- registration to participate is not required. Invitations will be generated from a national population register.

# PROTECT YOUR FAMILY/WHĀNAU FROM FLU THIS WINTER

Whanganui District Health Board (WDHB) and the Immunisation Advisory Centre are advising people to start thinking about flu immunisations which remain the best way to protect family/whānau from influenza or the 'flu' this winter. Flu vaccines will be arriving in surgeries and participating pharmacies in April - the best month for people to get their annual flu shots to ensure they're protected before flu season strikes in winter.

This year's vaccines are expected to offer protection against the strain that circulated in the Northern Hemisphere during their winter season. Some media have been calling it the 'Aussie flu'. To better match circulating viruses, the two funded quadrivalent influenza vaccines will contain four inactivated virus strains, specially formulated for the New Zealand 2018 season.

### Please note - you can't get flu from the vaccine because there are no live viruses in it.

Flu immunisation is free for Whanganui residents from your doctor, nurse or qualified vaccinating pharmacist from April till the end of December, if you are:

- Aged 65 years or over
- Pregnant (any stage of pregnancy).
- Flu immunisation is free only from a doctor or nurse if you are:
- Aged under 65 years of age (including children) with long-term health conditions such as heart disease, stroke, diabetes, respiratory disease (including asthma that requires regular preventive therapy), kidney disease and most cancers.
- A child, aged four and under who has been hospitalised for respiratory illness or has a history of significant respiratory illness.

Even if you don't qualify for free immunisation from your doctor, nurse or pharmacist, you may still be able to get one free from your employer. Flu shots are also available for anyone for a fee from a doctor, nurse or some pharmacists.

Please encourage your family/whānau who can get a free flu shot to see their doctor, nurse or qualified vaccinating pharmacist.

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# Amazing Alabasters bring home national titles

Taihape is very proud of its two NZ champions who came out on top at the New Zealand Shearing and Woolhandling Championships in Te Kuiti last week.

It was "amazing" for the eighth time when Taihape school teacher, mother-of-one and former world champion Sheree Alabaster won the NZ open woolhandling title for an eighth time in Te Kuiti on Saturday. The 43-year-old, who earlier this year claimed her 50th win in open finals, dominated the blend, oddment and fleece components of a five-handler final of six second-shear fleeces each, in the Waitomo Cultural and Arts Centre, beating runnerup Logan Kamura, of Marton, by nine points. Third, almost five points further back after



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dominating on time and board work, was reigning world champion Joel Henare.

Alabaster explained her repeated success in Te Kuiti, in contrast to being yet to win a Golden Shears Open, by saying: "I love it here. I love the atmosphere.' Making it more"amazing" was that she was able to put the family name on the 2018 honours board for a second time, after 14-year-old cousin Reuben Alabaster's junior shearing final win on Thursday. Alabaster's mother, Libby, is a woolhandling judge and late-father Ray Alabaster competed at the first Golden Shears as a teenager in 1961 and was runner-up in two of his nine Golden Shears Open shearing finals. Sheree Alabaster, who previously won the national title, 3 ears in a row in 2004-2006, and again in 2009, 2011, 2012 and 2014, had one of her better seasons in 2017-18 with seven wins. They included the North Island Circuit final during the Golden Shears, which claimed her place in the New Zealand transtasman series for next season with Henare, who retained his place by winning the New Zealand Woolhandler of the Year final in Balclutha

in February.

# Update on the Multi Sport Turf

The new multisport turf at Rangitikei College has been open for a number of months now and is being well used by both local schools and Rangitikei College, as well as members the community at large.

The turf is never locked so it can be used by anyone at any time when it hasn't been booked.

Some families have been playing tennis there and groups of children hsave been seen kicking a soccer ball around. Rangitikei College hosted the Mitre 10 triathlon at the school recently, with the cycle leg departing from the acrylic netball surface at the front of the courts, whilst Nga Tawa was playing some of its interschool tennis matches on the adjacent courts.

During the school holidays, lights above the turf are going to be installed by The Downs Group. This is going to further extend the use of the facility over the winter months and Rangitikei Hockey Association will be running junior competitions on the turf.



The Rangitikei College multisport turf was opened in November last year and the surrounding fence features local sportspeople. The turf is now being well used by local schools and the public.

Recent controversy surrounding the turf project contractor Shane Gribbon who completed the ground work and is a board member, has been settled with the Ministry of Education by the school Board of Trustees which has explained its reporting error regarding conflict of interest ssociated with major spending.

# NGA TAWA STUDENT BARCELONA BOUND FOR INTERNATIONAL SCIENCE RESEARCH

Nga Tawa Year 13 student, Lara Westraad has been selected to participate in the Barcelona International Youth Science Challenge (BIYSC) in the next school holidays from July 9 – July 20 2018. Lara, an aspiring doctor, was nominated to apply by her Biology teacher, Ms Daddy. She had to answer a number of questions and provide references to support her application.



100 students from 18 different countries were selected and assigned in groups of ten, to research projects. Lara was given her

first choice and will be involved in researching Instructive biomaterials for regenerative medicine, at the Institute for Bioengineering of Catalonia (IBEC).

Lara and nine others will undertake a number of different experiments and observations using biomaterials to regenerate tissue cells which will one day hopefully, result in regenerating organs.

"I'm so excited to have been selected. I doubt I would have had the opportunity to go to Spain otherwise," she said. "I'll get some free time to explore Barcelona with the rest of the group and can't wait to visit the Sagrada la Familia, Gaudi's building and of course sample lots of tapas! "

Lara has contacted BIYSC to see if anyone else has been selected from New Zealand in the hope someone may be able to keep her company for the long-haul flight to Spain. iN the meantime, she'll be busy applying for grants and brainstorming fundraising ideas over the holidays, to help cover the costs of her flights and the programme registration fee.



# WARNING: RIVER LEVEL INCREASE

FLOW CHANGES IN THE MOAWHANGO AND RANGITIKEI RIVERS

Genesis Energy's resource consents for the Tongariro Power Scheme require flushing flow releases from Moawhango Dam. This release is the fifth of five releases for the summer of 2017-2018. The purpose of the flushing flow is to help improve the ecology of the Moawhango River. # Hunters urged to identify their target

'The recent death of a hunter in the Kaimai Forest is a tragedy and sadly a timely reminder to all hunters that they need to take special care when hunting', says Joe Green, chair of the Firearms Safety Council. 'While all seven basic rules of firearms safety in the Arms Code apply, there are two of those rules that

especially apply in this instance' says Joe as he reminds hunter to always ensure your firearm is pointed in a safe direction. This includes when hunting with a companion and if you lose sight of your companion. You both need to stop hunting until you have re-established contact.


'No direction is a safe direction simply because you don't know where your mate is', Joe says.

'Even if you think you see a deer, it could be your mate'. "While not going into details about the recent tragedy, past incidents have often been attributed solely to failing to identify the target beyond all doubt. In about 50% of cases the hunter shoots a mate they are hunting with. They've become separated and lost track of each other. It remains important to identify your target beyond all doubt.

Never shoot at shape, colour, movement or sound. Any of
