Celebrating **Agrikids**

South Makirikiri School held a special 15 year anniversary evening for its past and present Agrikids competitors and sponsors, last Thursday.

Two teams from South Makirikiri School are making their way to Invercargill today to compete in the 2018 contest; being staged alongside the NZ Young Farmer of the Year final. Last week, members of the teams spoke to the audience at the anniversary evening, thanking sponsors and presenting a personal profile.

Also present were former South Makirikiri School pupils who have represented the school and the region as Agrikids over the past 15 years; in contests all over the country. Some got up and spoke about their experiences and their present careers; some in agriculture. One included a recorded message from the UK from Sarah Bowler who works for Dairy NZ.

The 2018 Manawatu-Taranaki regional winner of Young Farmer of the Year, Will Taylor, also spoke about his journey to the national final at last week's local function. It's the 50th anniversary of the iconic agricultural contest, which was first held in Auckland in 1969. South Makirkiri School has a fine record in Agrikids, since it joined the contest in 2003, winning the NZ Agrikids grand final in 2014. Its teams have been well placed in many regional and national finals, including the current senior and junior teams, who competed in Wellington to qualify for the 2018 national finals.

Over the past 15 years, more than 90 pupils have been involved in the South Makirikiri School Agrikids programme and they've been supported by many sponsors and parents. Those supporters were all thanked for their contribution at last week's anniversary event.

Great turnout for men's health brekkie



About 120 men called into the Men's Health Week brekkie last week in Marton.

There was an excellent turnout to the Rangitikei Men's Health Week Tradies Brekkie last Thursday at McVerry Crawford Motors Ltd showroom.

Organiser WDHB public health nurse Marilyn Archibald says she received lots of positive feedback from the breakfast gathering and speaker Dr Dave Baldwin said he was delighted with the response. He thought the attendees were the right group of men - the group that need to be targeted because it's working men who have the highest health issues.

Marilyn says that feedback from one local boss said, "It was evident Dr Dave's messages and delivery were powerful with men engaged and listening."

One boss said the men returned to work buzzing and saying the event made them reflect on what was important. Another commented that he was impressed with learning to have fun and would be checking out laughter yoga and taking on board that "being happy, relationships and friends are important part of good health".

There was a good cross section of ages at the breakfast which started at 6.45 until 8.30am. A young man who attended said he got a lot out of the talk because it was fun and it made you realise that good health was not only about looking after your bits but also how you think and what you do.

Approx 120 people attended last week's event which was also held last year.

Some of the participants left early or were in-and-out but participants who stayed throughout the talk reported increased awareness of men's health issues.

At long last it's going to be built

I'm sure a lot of you thought the Bulls Community Centre was not going to happen. I am proud to tell you that this week the tender process starts for the new centre. Tenders will be open for a month and hopefully, not too long after that, we may see some construction on the Criterion site.

There has been a lot of work behind the scenes to get us to this point. Lots of applications for grants and funding - some not successful. But, despite that, Council has decided to push ahead and build this excellent facility for Bulls.

Earlier this year, when Council consulted on our Long Term Plan, the direction you gave us was clear -just get on and build the facilities that we have been speaking about for the past few years. You have shown faith in us, so we have decided to go to the next stage and go through this tender process. The tender documents will also be sent to a number of companies that expressed interest as building contractors. Council will need to formally approve the acceptance of a tender. However, I am confident that we will see construction

Horizons' grants spread across region

Twelve community groups from across the Manawatū-Whanganui region, including Rangitikei, are to receive full funding for their projects under Horizons Regional Council's community grants programme.

Set up at the beginning of 2012, the programme was established to support community groups, schools, early childhood centres and iwi/hapū groups, with projects that enhance the region's natural resources and encourage more people to engage with the natural environment.

This year, \$21,384 was up for grabs, with 27 applications asking for over \$40,000. Due to the large number of applicants and worthy projects, the grants fund was supported with an additional \$8,520 from Horizons' community biodiversity projects budget. Horizons chair Bruce Gordon says applications were assessed on environmental benefits, feasibility, community involvement and long-term benefits.

"This year there were a noticeable number of requests for native planting and wetland restoration initiatives, as well as applications for plant and animal pest control," says Mr Gordon.

Recipents include: Kaitieke School – wetland and track improvements, Progress Castlecliff Inc – weed control, native plants and maintenance costs, Te One Bush Restoration Project – animal pest control, Kimbolton School – animal pest control monitoring, Kai Iwi School – outdoor classroom and forest area, Matipo Community Development Charitable Trust – completion of a propagation greenhouse and purchasing equipment, Puddleducks' Montessori Preschool – wetland restoration, Milson Scout Troop – animal pest control, Timona Park Orchard Trust – wetland restoration, weed control and native planting, South Makirikiri School – native planting, Mount Biggs School – walking track creation.







RANGITIKEILINE BULLETIN

Adoption of the 2018-28 Long Term Plan

At its meeting on 28 June 2018, Council adopted the 2018-28 Long Term Plan. The Council's Auditor was present at the meeting, an 'unmodified' opinion will be issued, meaning that the various requirements have been met, including the underlying information. The Plan will be available on the Council website and Council offices later this month.

The plan has a focus on the first three years, but includes budget projection for a full ten years, while the infrastructure strategy (which covers roading, water, wastewater, stormwater and community and leisure assets) extends for thirty years. These longerterm perspectives are essential for understanding Council's debt and the costs of servicing that.

Council also adopted the Waste Management and Minimisation Plan.

Bulls community centre

Tenders have now been called for the proposed new community centre for Bulls on Criterion Street and will close on 6 August 2018. Meanwhile, great progress is being made on the house provided by Central House Movers to be relocated on Council land in Walton Street and sold as part of fund-raising for the facility.

Community housing

The only houses in public ownership in the Rangitikei are those owned and managed by the Council - in Taihape, Marton, Bulls and Ratana. Council has considered other options but decided that it is in the community's interests to continue direct

ownership and management. However, the houses need upgrading and that means finding a source of external funding. After extensive discussion with the Ministry of Social Development, Council has opted to increase the rental so that tenants qualify for an accommodation supplement. At the same time, Council will subsidise electricity, through its buying power and for the first year top-up the accommodation supplement so that there is no increase to tenants receiving National Superannuation. That top-up will be phased out over two years.

Memorandum of Understanding with partnering organisations

Council has approved the work plans of the four community organisations operating under a joint Memorandum of Understanding together with the grants to be made to each. The organisations are the Taihape Community Development Trust, Mokai Patea Services, Project Marton and Bulls and District Community Trust. For the first time, these plans have been discussed with the relevant Community Board or Community Committee, and the MoU reinforces their role in the partnership.

marton Skatepark extension

Council has committed an additional \$60,000 to the skatepark extension project at Centennial Park, Marton. This will include an upgrade to the present facility, now ten years old. Since first formally discussed with Council a year ago, the steering group has secured \$132,000 in external sponsorship and is determined to secure the rest before construction starts, in February 2019.

New dog exercise area – Turakina

Council has accepted the recommendation from the Turakina Reserve Management Committee that the Turakina Reserve become a dog exercise area under the Control of Dogs Bylaw. The exceptions will be when the annual Caledonian Games are held or other events requiring exclusive use of the Reserve.

EECA audit

Council has recently received energy reports for the Hunterville Rural Water Supply, Marton Pool and the wastewater treatment plants at Taihape and Marton. The Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority (EECA) provided financial assistance and approved the contractor. These are Council's four largest users of power. Most of the recommended changes will require additional investment. The reports are available on the Council website in the Meetings section.

Farewell George McIrvine

George McIrvine died suddenly on 2 July. He had been Council's Group Manager, Finance & Business Support Manager for nearly five years. During that time he brought new rigour to Council's financial management practices, including the electronic purchase order system and (most recently) a financial modelling software to manage the complexities of the long-term plan process. These and other initiatives lay behind this part of Council's operations receiving the highest assessment in last year's CouncilMARK Independent assessment report. His humour and Scottish dialect will long be remembered and he will be greatly missed. Our condolences go to his wife Diane and his two sons.
