

Water problems sorted

An urgent notice was put on Facebook for Marton residents to conserve water last Thursday but the emergency is all over now.

The Marton Reservoir dropped to low levels as a result of flushing to clear excess manganese.

Residents and businesses were asked to conserve as much water as possible until reservoir levels returned to normal. Rangitikei District Council was confident on Friday that the discoloured water issue at the Marton Water Treatment Plant was corrected and that water would be running clear in time for the weekend - which it was.

A water tanker was provided at the Marton Country Music Festival for visitors to obtain freshwater and a tanker was located near the Memorial Hall for residents.

CEO Ross McNeil says a process error at the plant earlier in the week resulted in discoloured water and he said, "We apologise to residents and business operators that were affected.

"If you have clothing or other material that has been stained by discoloured water, we ask that you contact us, as well as your insurer, as we may be able to help, says Mr McNeil. RDC staff flushed pipes around Marton township and residents were asked to run their taps, especially hot taps, to clear discoloured water. Mr McNeil says those properties with water metres won't be disadvantaged - if a property's annual water charge is noticeably higher as a result of the flushing required - Council would, on a case by case basis, look at reimbursement.

Marton draws its raw water from the B and C Dams, which are high in dissolved manganese. With the right level of pre-chlorination most of the manganese can be removed; through the treatment process preventing any water discolouration. On this occasion pre-chlorination level was not high enough.

"I want to thank residents and business operators for their patience and reiterate that we realise how frustrating this issue is for you and that we need to ensure the processes are in place, to provide clear drinking water, are consistently followed", says Mr McNeil.

Mayor Andy Watson says anyone who wants to speak to him can contact him through Council's 0800 number to make an appointment, talk to him on the phone or ask the Mayor to come to your home.

When Anna Lambert was working making Coffee in Relish Café Hunterville just before Christmas, there was more than an element of déjà vu, when a rain sodden dog came running into the customer service area of the café.

The dog looked somehow familiar, yet it was still with disbelief that she thought it could be her old dog Slipper, who had mysteriously disappeared around two full years ago.

Well known for taking off for a day or two, on a fairly regular basis, there had initially been little concern about Slipper, until three days rolled around with still no sign of the 11 year old little pooch. Following this, Anna asked around and put up notices in Hunterville in the hope that someone could provide information and hopefully return her missing wee pet, yet all this was to no avail ... until 2 years later.

After much speculation, the pieces of the jigsaw began to fall together. This dog was about the same size as Slipper. He was also missing his two front teeth, just like Slipper and being an alfa male, was still sporting the proverbial dogs' appendages. Yet it couldn't be, could it?

A bit of detective work on the tags showed that the current owner was now in Marton and that this actually was the long lost Slipper.

Turns out that the new owner had noticed the dog wandering aimlessly around Rata, about 10km south of Hunterville while heading north on SH1. 

Mediation for Resident Doctors

The NZ Resident Doctors Assn and DHBs bargaining teams will return to mediation on Thursday 24 January in Auckland ahead of the planned 48-hour strike on 29 and 30 January

- the second period of industrial action by resident doctors

"Any realistic opportunity to resolve this dispute ahead of next week's strike is something we must pursue," says NZRDA 's David Munro. "We are very grateful for the growing public support for NZRDA doctors to hold on to hard-won safety provisions in their collective agreement," he continues. "But at the same time we are mindful of the price being paid by patients because of the DHBs' intransigence."

If mediation is unsuccessful and next week's strike goes ahead, there is likely to be even greater disruption as doctors who have recently joined the RDA will now be participating in the

"Every indicator is towards strengthening determination to win this dispute. The Resident Medical Officers are not backing down and the key issues are now well understood by the public. With NZers now returning from the holiday break we expect even more pressure on DHBs to abandon their irresponsible and unreasonable approach, "he says.

Awarded First Responders certificates

When friends Shane Ratima and Alex Hall set out to play golf at the beginning of December, little did they know they would be involved in a life-saving event and later receive certificates for their valiant efforts. The drama unfolded at Rangatira golf course, when Alex noticed a commotion around someone lying on the ground and went over to investigate. An unresponsive man seemed to have swallowed his tongue which Alex tried to free, but with no cell phone was unable to call for help. Shane Ratima had also noticed the commotion from further away and ran for about 2 minutes to help. On his arrival, Alex used Shane's mobile phone to ring 111 for emergency services, while Shane began to administer CPR (Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation) on the unresponsive gent. Shane delivered two breaths, then 30 compressions, repeating this around 5 times before the man began to show signs of breathing again. This didn't last though and with the man then turning purple and draining of life, a further 10 repetitions or so were delivered, taking around 25 minutes of work and a broken rib or two, before the gent finally came too and began to breathe on his own again. The Fire Service and an ambulance, arrived from Hunterville and took over the operation, later assisted by emergency services from Marton. The 72 year old man was


whisked to Whanganui, then to Palmerston North and finally, Wellington for treatment and has since been cleared healthwise, after a recent check-up in Wellington. Shane said he would never have been able to have taken charge and effectively deliver CPR if he had not received vital training in this from Sandra Speirs of Medi-Train, who became aware of the incident via a long text from Shane. On hearing this, it was immediately decided to award 'First Responders' certificates to the pair for their life saving performance.

Sandra who is based in Taihape, covers a huge area, is fully NZQA qualified and has offers life-saving training for over 17 years following a career as a nurse and paramedic. She said "the first 3 minutes are crucial to keep blood flow to the brain and the first 'Golden Hour' after a medical incident is vital. Always immediately contact emergency services first, well before calling friends or family."

After years of discussion, it's finally going to happen! A musical collaboration between local artist Richard Aslett and Wellington musician/actor Steve Wright.



Help for SMEs to accelerate Health & Safety appreciated

Extra investment in workplace injury prevention, with a focus on Small to Medium Enterprises, will pay dividends not only in reducing pain and suffering but also in economic terms, Federated Farmers says.

"We see the recent announcement by ACC Minister Iain Lees-Galloway of a \$22 million, five-year programme to incentivise SMEs to boost health and safety efforts, as very useful," Feds president Katie Milne says."Most farms are in this small to medium business category and the minister is right, when he says barriers to accessing such things as workplace capability development, professional health and safety consulting advice and capital investment in significant safety equipment, are often too high, thus limiting uptake.

"Long-term injury rehabilitation and loss of productivity from injury carries a high price tag, alongside the pain, stress and grief for the individuals and their families."

Five sectors currently represent over half (52%) of all severe workplace injuries - agriculture, forestry, construction, manufacturing and healthcare/social assistance. There's a lot of work still to do to develop sector-specific safety initiatives and this new stream of grants and assistance will help," Katie says. Historically agriculture hasn't had a structure and formal focus on health and safety- the plan of action has tended to reside in the farmer's head. But progress is accelerating now.

Farmers recognise that the injury and fatality statistics in their line of work are far too high. The combination of health & safety challenges facing farm businesses are different to many other workplaces - weather, operating machinery over difficult terrain, working in isolated places, sometimes unpredictable animal behaviour.

"More help, training programmes and safer equipment specific to our sector will protect farming families and their staff," Katie says.

Region's house prices rising quickest in NZ

In December, the Manawatu,Rangititkei,Wanganui region again had the highest annual growth rate, a 17.7% increase to a new record high of 2,867 on the REINZ House Price Index for NZ which measures the changing value of property in the market. It is followed by Gisborne/ Hawke's Bay with an annual growth rate of 13.7% to a new record high of 2,654 and in third place was Otago with a 12.4% annual increase to a new record high of 2,867.

Bulls currently has the quickest rising house prices in NZ and Marton is at 10 on the list.

Bindi Norwell REINZ CEO says, "As predicted, the Manawatu/Rangitikei/Wanganui market remained buoyant throughout December with the second lowest days to sell of all the regions in the country and median house prices were up 11.7%

year-on-year. The REINZ House Price Index indicated the region achieved a new record high of 2867. Additionally, the Whanganui District saw a record median price of \$259,000 and climbing. \$320,000 is the current median house price to December 2018, with an average of 3 days selling time.

However, the region continues to see low inventory numbers, with total inventory down 23% year-on-year and a 13.1% drop in new listings compared to one year ago. Attendance rates at open homes rose in early December but slowed closer to the Christmas break, which was to be expected. The new year will most likely be stable, and we will see if the LVR changes will create more activity in the market."

The median number of days to sell a property nationally increased by 3 days from 32 to 35 when compared to December last year.

Ducks by the hundred get 'blinged up' for scientific research


Hundreds of Bay of Plenty ducks are helping scientific research into their populations and habits by getting "blinged up" with bright, shiny bands on their legs. The annual research programme by Fish & Game sees the small metal bands put on the ducks' legs to help gather crucial data, such as the birds' movements, productivity, population sizes and survival rates. Each band has a unique number which is recorded in the national bird banding data base administered by the Department of Conservation. When a band is recovered, the number will show where and when the duck was originally banded and how long it has lived and travelled. Some ducks travel surprising distances, with bands being recovered from Pacific islands such as New Caledonia. This week, a team of Fish & Game's eastern region staff and volunteers have begun banding at Waewaetutuki Reserve near Pongakawa in the Bay of Plenty. The banding programme has been running for 23 years and results in thousands of ducks throughout the North Island being banded. As well as the eastern region, Fish & Game in Wellington, Auckland/Waikato and Taranaki are also part of the duck banding programme. The information gathered from the banding research helps Fish & Game set sustainable duck harvesting numbers for the game bird hunting season and determine how long the season should last.

Mystery surrounds potential world record trout catch

Fish and Game is trying to confirm reports of a giant trout - a potential world record holder - recently caught in the Mackenzie Country hydro canals. Eyewitnesses report seeing an angler land a 24.9kg (55 pound) brown trout in the Pukaki-Ohau A canal if confirmed, it would be a new world record for a brown trout. According to the International Game Fish Association website, the present record is a 19.1 kg (42lb 1oz) fish caught in the same canals in 2013. But Fish and Game field officer for the central South Island region Rhys Adams says confirming the potentially record-breaking monster trout is proving difficult. "Secrecy surrounds the catch and we want to solve the mystery," he says. "This is an amazing fish and we would love to confirm it but at the moment, the lucky angler is keeping quiet. Because of the international significance of the catch, we would like to hear from anyone who has more information or details." Fish and Game communications advisor Richard Cosgrove says some details are starting to emerge. "Witnesses say the fish was landed after a two and a half hour fight. Once he had the fish landed, the angler wrapped it in his shirt, to keep it cool, before getting ice from a nearby salmon farm and rushing the fish to a taxidermist. He also got it weighed on certified scales to confirm that it was the fish of a lifetime. We have been told the whole story, along with photos, will emerge once the trout has been mounted." The Mackenzie basin hydro canals have a well-deserved reputation in New Zealand and overseas for consistently producing huge trout. The canals are easy to access, flow through spectacular high country scenery and are open all year round. But it is the number of huge trout living there which attracts thousands of anglers every year, making the canal network the country's most popular freshwater sports fishery. According to Fish and Game's latest canal harvest survey, anglers made approximately 43,800 daytime visits to the canal fishery during the 2015-2016 season. Rhys Adams says those anglers are catching big trout. "Rainbow trout have the most impressive seasonal catch figures. Around 30 percent of rainbows are trophy size (between ten and 20 pounds) with nine percent classed as 'exceptionally large' - that's over 20 pounds." Rhys Adams hopes the monster brown trout catch can be confirmed. "It's much rarer to catch an exceptionally large brown trout - only about one percent of browns caught in the canals fall into this category, so it would be nice to make this official. "The size of these trout just reinforces how good New Zealand's trout fishing is. If we can confirm this brown trout record, then the next thing is setting a new world record for rainbow trout," Rhys Adams says. "The present record is 21.77kgs - 48 pounds - for a rainbow trout caught in Canada in 2009. "It would be nice to challenge that but even if we can't, anglers will enjoy trying."
