


Each won a prize of \$100 and others who entered received a certificate and a box of chocolates.

Gwen (nee Coleman) ended up living in the same home after she married Ken Neilsen, and they eventually moved in to take up residence.


Before her marriage, Gwen lived opposite the Hull- Nielsen home in Hair St and met and married Ken but she was originally from Bonny Glen.

SH1 blocked twice on Good Friday

Over the Easter weekend, the Bulls Bridge was blocked. One person was injured and in a serious condition after cars crashed, blocking both lanes of the bridge.

A police spokeswoman said at least two cars were involved in a crash at 10.50am on Good Friday on the Rangitikei River bridge, which forms part of SH1 and 3 just south of Bulls. Traffic was diverted, having to take, Kakariki Rd, Mingaroa Rd and Wilson Rd. The crash was cleared and the road reopened by 12.10pm.

Emergency services attended a crash involving a car and a truck on the Desert Rd between Waipakihi Rd and Rangipo Intake Rd, at 3.27pm.

Police have released the names of the two children who died following the crash on the Desert Road on Friday 30 March. They were Arteen Mosaferi, 4 years old, and Radeen Mosaferi, two months old.

The boys were from Hamilton. Arteen died at the scene and Radeen died at Starship Hospital on Monday from injuries sustained in the crash. Another person involved in the crash remains in a critical condition in Waikato Hospital.

Police extended their deepest sympathies to the family of Arteen and Radeen for their tragic loss. The Serious Crash Unit and the Commercial Vehicle Safety team are investigating the cause of the crash.

Niwa weather outlook

Niwa reports that April – June 2018 temperatures are forecast, with high confidence, to be above average for all regions of New Zealand.

The warm ocean waters around the country are forecast to persist through the next three months but by the end of winter, are expected to return to near normal west of the country. Even though seasonal-average temperatures are very likely to be above normal, frosts will occur in cooler locations, as late autumn progresses.

For April – June 2018, rainfall totals are forecast to be above normal in the north and east of the North Island, near normal in the west of the South Island and near normal or above normal in all other regions.

April – June 2018 soil moisture levels and river flows are forecast to be near normal or above normal (40% chance) in the west of the North Island.

Submissions sought BITS n' PIECES to shape the region

Horizons Regional Council is calling for the public to have its say on its Proposed 2018-28 Long-term Plan (LTP), which was adopted in a Regional Council meeting last week

The proposed LTP sets out how Council intends to manage the region's land, air and water resources over the next 10 years. This includes planned work programmes and activities and what rate contributions will be required to help cover the proposed costs for each year.

Horizons chair Bruce Gordon says Horizons council has been workshopping all areas of the organisation for over six months.

"This has included discussing what challenges lie ahead and what needs to be put in place to mitigate factors such as more frequent and intense storms, hill country erosion, biosecurity threats, maintaining and upgrading infrastructure, and adapting to changes in central government policies." says Mr Gordon.

"As a result we have identified a need to increase expenditure for some of our work programmes. The proposed LTP forecasts an average rate increase of 7.44 per cent for the region in Year 1, 4.54 per cent for Year 2, and below the predicted rate of local government inflation plus 2 per cent for Year 3 onwards.

"It's important to note that these rates will differ district by district due to factors such as property valuations and targeted rates for programmes such as river management schemes and passenger transport.

"We appreciate that any rate increase isn't ideal and that is why we have compiled a consultation document to help highlight what some of the key items are in our plan.

"These include changes to river management and drainage schemes, especially in areas such as the Tararua and Ruapehu districts, Ohakune, lower Whanganui, Feilding and Foxton; economic development and whether we should establish a regional facilities fund; and our commercial investments.

"We are also asking our communities whether they would like us to retain the Capital Connection service, what they think of our proposed community outcomes and whether we should change the region's and council's name, to include a macron over Manawatū and adding a 'h' to Whanganui. We welcome all submissions, big or small, as every piece of feedback we receive provides us with a greater understanding of our communities' priorities. This will help us to better align those priorities with Horizons' work going forward."

Submissions to Horizons 2018-28 LTP close on 30 April 2018. The consultation document and further supporting documentation is available online at haveyoursay.horizons.govt.nz and from Horizons' service centres. Submission forms are also available online and will be delivered to letterboxes throughout the region over the next week or so.

Greypower

The decision by the Commerce Commission to approve the application by Powerco for a Customised Price Path (CPP) is no surprise but is a slap in the face for the ordinary customer says Tom O'Connor president of the Grey Power Federation.. "Despite submissions by Grey Power, the Major Energy Users Group and industry experts, that the draft determination was flawed, the Commerce Commission's final decision has no material changes reflecting the concerns raised.

Grey Power's submission acknowledged that the expenditure sought was necessary but queried the practice of increasing costs to consumers to cover this and then using the value of the improved assets to determine the allowed rate of return in future years. In their final decision, the Commission acknowledge the impact of this saying, 'In the years following the CPP period, we expect the capex investment will place continued upwards pressure on prices, as the full value of the investments enters the regulatory asset base. ... We estimate the impact on the average monthly residential consumer's bill to be around \$2.70 within the CPP period' and 'an additional average price increase in the order of \$6 in the subsequent regulatory period." Grey Power acknowledges the Commission's recognition of these concerns and their commitment to 'look at the issue again when Powerco transitions from the CPP price path' but note that their justification for the current pricing practice ignores the artificial value placed on the lines companies assets when they were appropriated from the public purse or that the CPP itself provides a mechanism for Powerco to recover its costs from the consumer base.

"Grey Power considers this practice of charging consumers on the basis of a revalued Regulatory Asset Base, where the increase is a result of consumer funded improvements, iniquitous and we will be raising the matter with the minister as part of her wider review of the electricity supply industry."

Flu vaccine will be arriving in surgeries and participating pharmacies this month, the best month for people to get annual flu shots to ensure they're protected before flu season strikes in winter. This year's vaccines are expected to offer protection against the strain that's been circulating in the Northern Hemisphere during their winter which some media called the 'Aussie flu.' To better match circulating viruses, the two funded quadrivalent influenza vaccines will contain four inactivated virus strains, specially formulated for the New Zealand 2018 season. It is important to note that, because there are no live viruses in the vaccine, people can't get flu from the vaccine.

Is flu a serious illness?

Flu is not the same as a cold. It's a serious disease that can make other existing conditions, such as breathing or heart problems, even worse, with some people ending up in hospital and some dying.

Influenza usually has symptoms such as a sudden onset of illness, high fever, headache, a dry cough and illness which usually lasts seven to 10 days. Older people, pregnant women and their babies and people with certain medical conditions are more likely to have medical complications from influenza. Influenza in pregnancy increases the risks of premature birth, low birth weight, miscarriage, stillbirth or birth defects.

Annual influenza immunisation helps reduce these risks.

Does the flu shot work?

For many people, flu shots help prevent flu or make it a less severe. However, like all vaccines, influenza vaccine is not 100 percent effective in everyone. Effectiveness depends on several factors, including the age and immune status of the recipient, as well as the match between circulating vaccine strains and the

Influenza immunisation only works on the flu virus. Sometimes people say they got the flu from the vaccine, when it was more likely they caught a cold or other respiratory virus, or the vaccine didn't have time to work before they became infected with the virus. It can take up to two weeks for the vaccine to start providing protection.

Other helpful tips

As well as getting an influenza shot you can protect yourself and your family/ whānau from influenza if you:

- Wash and dry your hands
- Stay away from people
- who are sick Stay away from work,
- school or people in hospital, if you're unwell
- · Cover your coughs and

Greater focus on how quad bikes and other farm vehicles are used is a necessary change to farm health and safety inspections, says Vanessa Winning, DairyNZ's general manager for farm

performance.

"We see injuries and fatalities from quad bikes, in particular, far too frequently within our farming communities," says Ms Winning. "We all need to be looking more closely at

the vehicles we use on farm and consider what's the safest vehicle for the job.

"DairyNZ has already removed most quad bikes from its research farms, because there are safer ways for our staff to move around the farm.

"Getting people to really think about what farm vehicles they use and whether the vehicles are being used safely, is a behavioural change we need to start seeing now. The sector's fatality and injury rates are just too high.

"It's good to get these conversations going, but we know that education alone won't change the way people use quad bikes. We also need to see roll over protect bars and other safety devices becoming commonplace on farm vehicles.

"DairyNZ supports Worksafe's new initiative Safer Vehicles - Safer Farms to help farmers make the right decisions when using vehicles. We want all people on-farm to go home to their families safe and well at the end of every day."

Consultation Document for the 2018-28 Long Term Plan Adopted

At the Council meeting on 29 March 2018, Council's Audit Director, Debbie Perera, presented her opinion on the Consultation Document for the 2018-28 Long Term Plan. She considered that the Consultation Document fairly represented the matters proposed for inclusion in the long-term plan and identified and explained the main issues and choices facing the Council and district.

Council formally adopted the Plan. Consultation opens on 4 April 2018 and closes on 4 May 2018, during this time there will be a number of public meetings throughout the District. The two main choices highlighted for submission are over Council's direct provision of a kerbside recycling and rubbish service and the various options for Council to promote the District's economic development.

The Consultation Document is available for downloading from the Council website; copies have been placed in the libraries, and are available by phoning the Council on 0800 422 522.

Council is also consulting on several other proposals, including the proposed Schedule of fees and charges, the draft Waste Management and Minimisation Plan, the amended Rates Remission Policy on Maori Freehold Land, the amended Significance and Engagement Policy, the amended Revenue and Financing Policy and the proposed Development Contributions Policy.

Drainage at Scotts Ferry

Tracey Gibbs, and a number of residents of the Scotts Ferry settlement, spoke during Public Forum at Council's meeting on 29 March. They highlighted the need for drainage improvements. A contributing factor has been the build-up of silt by over one metre since the 2004 floods. Provision has been included in the draft Long Term Plan for work during 2018/19.

Acceptance of Treated Leachate at the Marton Wastewater **Treatment Plant**

Council considered a report on continuing to accept treated leachate from the Bonny Glen landfill. The ammonia content is manageable, particularly once the Marton wastewater treatment plant moves to discharge to land rather than the Tutaenui Stream. A trade waste agreement will document the volume, quality and seasonal timing of this treated effluent. In the six months ending 31 December 2017, Council received \$149,000 for accepting treated

The Marton/Bulls Wastewater Treatment Upgrade Project Advisory Group has endorsed this approach.

Ratana – Waru Noema Centenary – The Centennial Celebrations

Rapene Karena and Gaylene Nepia addressed Council on the celebrations to be held in November 2018. Visitor numbers are expected to be at least 20,000. Temporary structures, additional toilets, showers, waste management and a traffic management plan are key planning issues which will involve the Council. Consideration is being given to an alternative road access to reduce volumes on Ratana Road.

Requests to Council for financial assistance will be made through the Ratana Community Board.

Ngati Apa - Purchase of Turakina Maori Girls College site

Pahia Turia, Chair of Ngati Apa, spoke to the Council about the recent purchase of the former Turakina Maori Girls College site. This provides an opportunity for Ngati Apa to consolidate its services (currently delivered in Bulls and Marton) and expand them. An educational element will be part of that.

Council approved a rates remission to the level applied to the former Turakina Maori Girls College for a period of two years.

Extension of Taihape Swim Centre Swimming Season

Westend Aquatics, the operator of the Taihape Swim Centre, proposed opening the centre from 29 September 2018 (the first day of the school holidays) rather than the beginning of November as has been the case in previous years. Council has agreed to this, subject to receiving a business plan.

Amendment to the Speed Limit Bylaw

It is proposed to lower the speed limit along Dixon Way and the short sections of Otaihape Valley Road and Mangaone Valley Road, utilising the changes in speed-setting rules which came into force late last year. This enables actual driving speed and the risk to numerous walkers on the roads to be taken into account.

Council has requested the Taihape Community Board hear oral submissions and undertake deliberation on all submissions received and provide a recommendation back to Council.
