




Spitfire flies to mark its 10th anniversary

Marton's own World War 2 Supermarine Spitfire, based at RNZAF Ohakea, is celebrating a special anniversary next Monday (18 March), with a special evening display at Ohakea; subject to weather. On that date in 2009 at 6-12pm it took to the skies for the first time since January 1956, after a fiveyear, 35,000 hour restoration. Originally built in England in September 1944, it served in the war with the Royal Air Force in Italy. Post war it served with the Italian Air Force, Israeli Air Force and finally the Burmese Air Force.

It remained a "gate guardian" outside a Burmese Air Force base



To mark its connection with Marton, the Spitfire will precede its display at Ohakea by a couple of orbits around the town shortly after 6pm. For the anniversary display the Spitfire will be under the control of regular pilot Squadron Leader Sean Perrett, an instructor on the Beechcraft T6 Texan at Ohakea.

The display at Ohakea will commence at 6-12pm (the same time as the restored aircraft's first flight in 2009) and will be its usual airshow display. Next duties for the Spitfire include an appearance at the Classic Wings airshow at Blenheim over Easter and then its annual ANZAC Day circuit around the region with its stablemate the Grumman Avenger.



Bound in heaven

We sometimes think we are far from the world of 'alternative facts' and 'fake news' in our rural township of Marton and the greater Rangitikei. Coming home last Tuesday (5 Mar), I found an interesting "newspaper" in my letterbox with the banner headline "This Coming Sunday Law" in colour print with a superimposed image of President Trump and Pope Francis. I was intrigued!

On further reading I found it was a fairly wild attack on the Catholic Church (I declare an interest here; I am a practising Catholic). On further inspection of the publication there was no reference as to who had printed it, no church association; nothing at all to indicate where I might seek clarification on many of their quotes, whether in context or not. A poor introduction I thought, in this age of fake news.

The "paper's" primary pillar of attack appears to be the change of the Sabbath from Saturday to Sunday, as practiced by many mainstream Christian faiths. On that basis, using many prophecies from Daniel and Revelations, the paper goes on to announce a new world order that will be a combination of the Catholic Church (led by the Pope) and the US government - based on the fact that the US Capitol dome is similar to the Vatican dome of St Peter's. The paper didn't mention St Paul's in London or the Taj Mahal. At this stage my credulity was a little tested as I tried to visualise Pope Francis and President Donald Trump striding the world stage hand in hand.

I was challenged by its (the article's) content sufficiently, to look up the rationale for moving the Sabbath from Saturday to Sunday. There is a heap of stuff on the net, with regard to this. So, I won't bore readers with all the references - they are there; starting off with the Roman emperor Constantine (who was not yet a Christian).

I did return to a biblical reference in Mathew, Mark and Luke; this is where Peter recognises Jesus as the long-awaited messiah. Jesus then says to Peter:

"Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock, I will build my church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. Marton to mark 150 years of town's naming

The 150th anniversary of the day Marton was renamed will occur in October this year. It coincides with the 250th anniversary of Captain James Cook setting foot on land in New Zealand.

Marton Historical Society is organising a special day on October 5 to celebrate "the day they named it Marton" and activities will be centred around the Marton Museum village and Memorial Hall.

The day will include a re-enactment of how the name came about, so there will be a search for descendants of the original committee from 1869.

Pat Hayman from the Marton Historical Society says, "Apart from the Marton Museum being open, we are hoping for many local groups to present displays covering Marton sports, organisations, occupations, crafts, vehicles and historic skills relating to Marton's early history.

"If anyone has such skills to offer and to put on a display of crafts such as spinning, weaving, wheelmaking, costumes, blacksmithing, or entertaining, we would be very interested in hearing from you," says Pat.

"We also welcome local schools, clubs and sporting bodies and veteran car enthusiasts to a participate in this day.

"We are open to suggestions. The only thing we ask is, that if you are providing a display, your group arranges and organizes it on the day.

We hope Martonians will get on board and make this special 150th anniversary a fun and interesting day for Marton.

She has really loved her time here so far. She likes the small town community feel of the place.







The parliamentary year got off to an interesting start with a dubious poll, and a Coalition whose disorganisation was again evident at the very first select committee, when Finance and Expenditure collapsed

for lack of a Government quorum despite a five hour agenda in front of it. The Prime Minister's statement said little and Simon Bridges' reply was very good. Winston Peters thrived on National's interjections, which gave him a break from trying to make a sensible speech of his own, especially one that was supposed to last for 20 minutes. I must say it felt like little had changed as a result of our six weeks off.

We did however have some interesting and challenging matters to deal with, as the year progressed -both at home and abroad. The most immediate was the very large and serious Nelson fires, which clearly demonstrated what a threat fire is to us all, especially when we saw an early summer that supported extraordinary growth, followed by a serious hot dry spell. The new Fire and Emergency team has done a great job in very difficult conditions and it shows much was learned from the Port Hills Fires of two years ago. It also shows us we are at risk of this happening more often, as climatic extremes become more prevalent.

The two other big challenges for New Zealand are abroad; with the Brexit debacle and its effects on us a comparative unknown. It certainly has the potential to pose serious issues for our trade in Britain and Europe if the cards fall the wrong way. Then of course there is our relationship with China, our biggest trading partner and very good friend to us over the last 15 or so years. It does appear as though the government has managed to test that relationship somewhat and they need to move quickly to sort it out. We are a country more dependent on trade than almost any other and it is vital that our Prime Minister, Trade Minister and Foreign Minister are working constantly on our relationships with all our trading partners. I am not confident that is happening right now.

More recently in the House, my Stock Rustling Bill has reappeared as a supplementary order paper to a Crimes Amendment Bill and should pass into law shortly – and in a much stronger and more effective state than I was able to introduce it as a Private Member's Bill. I need to thank Minister Little and the Primary Production Select Committee for that.

The Tax Working Group's Review is complete and has been announced. While it was probably meant to be an attack on the filthy rich, it looks much more like an attack on hard working middle income New Zealanders who have saved for their retirement, perhaps own a rental property which they intend to sell to retire on and find the Government may pinch the best part of it. National will be working to highlight the dangers of the outcomes of this review and await the result of the Government's consideration of it with much interest.
