NZRSA honours Hunterville man

Don Evans was taken by surprise at last week's Hunterville RSA meeting, when a group of family and friends turned up to see him awarded the NZRSA merit badge and certificate by district officer Chris Turner from Levin.

Don knew nothing about the award and was initially lost for words and had to take a moment to comprehend what had happened. Chris Turner said the merit badge presented by the Royal NZRSA was a very high honour indeed - so significant that it is one of the few awards when family is always invited to attend the presentation. The citation for Don's award read - "Don Evans is a well-known and highly respected local Hunterville farmer who, at the age of 79, is not only still farming but also very active in the community. In addition to over a quarter century dedicated to the Hunterville RSA as an executive committee member, welfare officer and six years as president, he also found time to support other local volunteer activities.

"The Presbyterian Church and Hunterville Bowling Club have also been beneficiaries of Don's charitable work, along with the Red Cross, in which he has supported his wife Denise's lifelong work. "It is not stating too strong a point to say that a number of these organisations would not now be operating in Hunterville, were it not for Don Evans and Denise's tireless commitment.

"Don continues to attend regular monthly RSA meetings and, in his capacity as welfare officer, seldom misses hub meetings with Hunterville president David Cole, to offer his experience and advice. He is always first on duty on ANZAC Day morning and one of the last to leave; when all the work is done."

Don has also been involved in the local dog trials organisation for over 50 years.

In reply, Don Evans said, "I feel this award is all about doing things for someone else. All of us do these things for others



without thought, or word. We don't do these things for any form of award." He said he was very flattered. While at the presentation, he also enjoyed a cuppa and a catch up with some old friends.

No EasyVote pack? Friday last day to enrol

Voters who haven't received their personalised EasyVote pack in the mail by now, need to enrol or update their details by this Friday.


"EasyVote packs were sent to all enrolled New Zealanders last week," says Chief Electoral Officer Alicia Wright. "If you haven't got yours, it means you're probably not enrolled, so get in touch now, to check your details. You need to be enrolled to be able to vote in the 2017 General Election."

The last chance to enrol is this tomorrow, Friday 22 September. There is no enrolment on election day, Saturday 23 September. "If you're not enrolled, just drop into any advance voting place and you'll be able to enrol and vote at the same time," says Ms Wright. "Remember, you can't enrol on election day."

Information about where, when and how to vote is available at www.elections.org.nz or by calling 0800 36 76 56.

People can enrol and vote at any advance voting place, or can get an enrolment form at www.elections.org.nz to print, sign and return.

"If you've got an EasyVote card, take it with you when you go to vote, as it will make voting faster and easier," says Ms Wright. "You can still vote if you don't have an EasyVote card, but it will take a bit longer. You don't need to take any kind of identification." In the Rangitikei 88.98% percent of voters are enrolled (as at 18 September) with 18-29 years showing the lowest enrolment level.

NZ tour features local banjo player



Former Turakina resident, banjo player BB Bowness (right) is touring NZ with an American bluegrass band next month. BB (Catherine) Bowness grew up at Turakina Beach and travelled on the road with her parents in the NZ Gypsy Fair caravan where she honed her banjo skills.

BB Bowness now lives in America, performing with the Mile Twelve Bluegrass Band, which has been on the rise in the US since its formation in 2014.

"I've been wanting to bring a full 5-piece bluegrass band back home for some time," says Bowness. "The music is so exciting, and it's not heard a lot outside of the USA."

"Booking our first NZ tour has been a huge undertaking, but it'll all be worth it when we get to share the music with everyone." Bowness moved to Boston in 2012, to chase her dream of playing the banjo for a living. The band will play live at The Whanganui Musicians Club on Saturday, October 14. Doors opens at 7pm, with music at 8pm and tickets are \$20. The band tour NZ and Aussie until early November: Boston-based band Mile Twelve captures the many shades of bluegrass, bringing their music to Australasia for the first time. Fast gaining recognition since their start in 2014, Mile Twelve has recently been nominated for the 2017 Momentum Award from the International Bluegrass Music Assn. "Our Last Goodbye" was featured on a Spotify "Fresh Bluegrass" playlist, and the band has opened for world-renowned artists. Mile Twelve has performed extensively throughout the US, Ireland and Canada, including sets at major U.S. bluegrass and folk festivals. www.miletwelvebluegrass.com


A distinguished 123rd Birthday



Steven Kerr has seen a 40 year spectrum of change working for the NZ railways service.

Steven Kerr belongs to an exclusive club in NZ today - he has served NZ railways for 40 consecutive years and his memory of railways in Marton as a thriving station and busy passenger stop, is as clear now as the day he started. A visit to the desolate Marton station last week was in stark contrast to the day he first arrived, when it was a bustling railway junction, surrounded by multiple goods sheds and storage buildings and two shunters stationed there tasked with dealing with carriages and working on a turntable. Marton was the main connection for passengers from Wanganui and surrounding districts. Trains still travel north, south, east and west today but next to none stop. Steven Kerr turned up for work at the Marton station on Monday September 19, 1977 and began work as a junior porter, dealing with passenger baggage, unloading carriages and cleaning the station. His father was a ganger at the Marton station with Jack Churchman. Steve worked his way up to Number Taker, Third Man in the yard, then Pointer Shunter and Senior Shunter...titles lost to the Marton railway yards. He says that things changed when NZ Railways was restructured in 1980. By 1989, Marton staff numbers dropped from 50 to 6 in one weekend – still a shocking thought to Steve. Numbers decreased to just two in 2000 - Steve and co-worker Marty Knowles. By 2001, Steve was the man left to lock up the station door for last time, after a century of railways in Marton.

He was transferred to Palmerston North railway station where he fills the position of Team Leader. He says Palmerston North is the “junction” now (a term still used to describe the area in Marton). Shunters are based in Palmerston North now and freight is sent from there in all directions; as it was from Marton. Steve has seen a full spectrum of change over 40 years working in NZ railways service. He says the changes destroyed the Marton Junction railways community. “It was like a giant family. Generations of families have worked here.”

The Marton yards serviced the smaller sidings like Pourewa, Bonny Glen and Cliff Rd, the Turakina Station and in the past, Greatford Station.

He says, “In Marton, there were 50 odd staff when it was in full swing. There were many allied tradesmen, including electricians and carpenters and it ran refreshment rooms in the past – the whole nine yards.”

He fondly remembers the old Junction social hall which is now located at Marton Junction School.

“I will likely see 50 years out, if I keep working.” He says he likes the shift work but says he has had permanent jet lag after 40 years of it. “I like the freedom of time during the day.”

He says railways has to come back but it needs government investment.

“Any current profit made from freight, goes back into the tracks,” he says. Overseas rail is seen as the way of the future and he thinks NZ roads can’t handle the increasing number of trucks.”

Steve will likely have 10 more years to see what happens - that will make him an extremely rare bird indeed.

A small number of local folk joined Taihape Community Development Trust’s manager Elizabeth Mortland in the council chambers at Taihape last week to mark 123 years since the first European settlers arrived in the town.

The occasion also marked the release of a new Taihape township map which was designed by local artist Leanne Adams. Taihape’s birthday celebrations were first instigated by the late Cr Eddie Cherry five years ago and it’s now a public event organised by TCDT. Ms Mortland said an apology had been received from mayor Andy Watson for not being able to attend. Denis Robertson’s book “Give me Taihape on a Saturday night,” chapter 2, co-written by Anne Potaka and Jackie Eustace says, “As it was just a location near the Otaihape stream, the area had no specific name attached to it for quite some time. Korokonui was one name associated with the area.”

Settlers arrived in 1894 and wanted to call the settlement Collinsville after their sponsor; a Mr Collins who recommended they choose a Maori name and suggested Hautapu. The government rejected that name because there was already an area called Hautapu, so the name Otaihape was selected. Eventually, the O was dropped away with government approval the settlement became Taihape. In 1839, the first European to enter the area was the Rev Henry Williams, a Methodist missionary. He was followed by Rev Richard Taylor in 1845 and William Colenso in 1847- a missionary and a botanist. Colenso’s main object was to establish a mission at Mokai Patea, now known as Moawhango.

Bee brew

Groups of hives have been appearing on Rangitikei farms recently. Beekeepers are taking advantage of the sustainable land around the district, paying farmers to locate hives on farms. It is a win, win for both parties.

The increase in hives in NZ and a poor summer last season has led to further research into sustainable bee feeding. AgriSea's natural brewing method assisted bee population during one of the toughest seasons last summer. Cold, wet, windy weather affected the honey harvest. With close to a million hives now in NZ, the poor summer last year hit the apiculture industry. New app to help farmers protect the environment

Farmers have a new tool to help them identify opportunities on farm to get even better environmental results.

DairyNZ has developed an app, called EnviroWalk, to make it easier for farmers to assess their fertiliser use, effluent, waterways, races, cropping, water use and irrigation and create an action plan on their smartphone.

About 1500 farmers have already downloaded the free app since it was launched in July.

DairyNZ lower North Island catchment engagement leader Adam Duker, who led the development of the app, says farmers are always looking for ways to improve their environment and we wanted to make it as easy as possible for them.

"The app allows them to have all the information they need at their fingertips."

He says the app has a series of yes/no questions to help farmers identify areas on their farm that have opportunities to do things differently and get better environmental outcomes. Depending on the answers to the questions, the app suggests solutions or actions. These form the basis of the action plan, which can be downloaded, printed and updated at any time.

"An added benefit is that once the app is downloaded, it can be used with no internet connection and accessed anywhere on-farm."

"We knew it would be successful because farmers helped us build the app and were part of its development."

Otago dairy farmer John Den Baars piloted the app on his Milton dairy farm.


He says the app helps take the guesswork out of assessing a farm's environmental impact.

"The EnviroWalk app is all things environmental for your farm in one place. It is user-friendly and a great tool for training the younger generation."

"I know the young staff I work with would rather do it on their phone than on a bit of paper and it's certainly faster than working out a plan the hard way."

The app is one of three apps that DairyNZ has developed to help farmers. The others are the Dairy Effluent Storage Calculator and BCS Tracker app. About 11,700 farmers around the country have downloaded the apps.

The EnviroWalk app can be downloaded on any device via the DairyNZ website, Apple App Store or Android Google Play Store.
