Taihape to host the World Boot Throwing Champs

in Taihape on March 23 and 24.

Newly appointed International Boot Throwing Association president Elizabeth Mortland says, "It's the first time that the world champs have been held in the southern hemisphere. So far, we can expect Finns, Germans (five of whom have already booked their travel), Estonians, Swedes and possibly French - as well as New Zealand's top throwers. Hopefully, Australians and Italians and maybe, throwers from Belgium, Russia and Poland, will also attend."

The World Boot Throwing Championships 2019 will be held Day 2019 and will draw even more people to Taihape for the annual, local contest.

> Elizabeth will also be contacting the marketing manager of NZ Tourism in London so that she can promote the event in England. She will also push the boot champs whilst in Italy. As she says, "Taihape is about to go international."

World champion boot throwers

Throwing a gumboot is not just a bit of fun, as there's a certain skill required to make it onto the podium at international level. Taihape's Elizabeth Mortland and Kieran Fowler from Dunedin have done just that - at the International Boot Throwing Championships held in Kinnula, Finland in July.

Elizabeth won the gold medal in the 65 - 69 year age group, with a throw of 17.23 metres and Kieran won the bronze in the open men's contest, with a throw of 55.15 metres. It's the first time that New Zealanders have been on the podium at this level. It is reported that Kieran, NZ men's champion, outshone some stiff competition, as did Elizabeth in her golden win. She will be at the International Boot Throwing Association's (IBTA) world cup in Italy next week.

The mayor of Kinnula, Pekka Kanervio, has suggested that his town links with Taihape under a Friendship Towns scheme. Rangitikei Mayor Andy Watson says he would welcome the mayor from Kinnula and extend the hand of friendship.

"I'm happy for that to be - by way of a friendship relationship between the two towns - with a common interest and/or event. "I don't see this as a matched sister city relationship, involving reciprocal visits and expense."

Mayor Watson said he will meet with Mr Kanervio at Gumboot Day next March and give him some sort of district acknowledgement, which he is yet to decide on.



A UCOL lecturer and graduate duo have taken out a gold award in the recent NZ Hospitality Championships in Auckland.

Chef training lecturer Mark Smith from Marton and his former student Zach Meads won gold in the Chatham Islands on a Plate category, which saw them prepare an entrée and main course out of ingredients from the Chatham Islands and sponsor Fresh As.

For their entrée, Mark and Zach made crayfish sous vide in butter and garlic, served with a Kiwi paua fritter, fennel citrus salad and crayfish reduction. Their main course was seared blue cod with mushroom and pine nut risotto, cray, cod and coconut croquette, pumpkin purée, rocket, and lime beurre blanc.

For Mark, it was his first competition in 12 years. He says he wanted to take part in the Chatham Islands on a Plate category because it was a new and unique category, which involved ingredients he enjoys working with.

"I liked the idea of this competition. I catch a lot of crayfish and blue cod, so I had some ideas for what we could do with those.I believe competitions are very good for students and I really enjoyed putting myself back into the competition environment and challenging myself against other top chefs in the country."

Mark enjoyed the opportunity to compete alongside Zach after he had taught him and coached him in competitions for the three years Zach studied at UCOL.

"It was great to work with Zach. I have a lot of confidence in him and we work well as a team. I was proud that we were able to pull off the win. Zach is an excellent young chef who is going places,

Giving a voice to the voiceless is what's driving Whanganui District Health Board Health promotion officer Chester Penaflor to get out and about in the Whanganui region, over the next month, to raise awareness about the risks of drinking while pregnant.

Mr Penaflor will be running Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) awareness stalls across four days in Marton, Taihape and Ohakune - as well as at Trafalgar Square in Whanganui city - this September.

The events are timed to support FASD Awareness Day on 9 September. Mr Penaflor says this date was chosen as a reminder about the nine months of pregnancy when an unborn child should be protected from the effects of alcohol. "Because unborn children have no voice, we must speak on their behalf," Mr Penaflor says.

FASD is the name given to the problems a baby may have if the mother drinks alcohol during pregnancy. Since alcohol in the bloodstream passes easily through the placenta, the baby is exposed to the same blood alcohol level as the mother. This can affect the baby's growth, especially the brain, with the risk of the baby having a range of life-long problems. Drinking alcohol can also increase the chances of premature birth, or losing the baby though miscarriage or stillbirth.

"By raising awareness about what causes FASD and the tragic consequences it can have on people's lives, we hope to encourage mothers not to drink while pregnant - or while

trying to get pregnant - so more babies are born healthy. Children should start life with the best chance to reach their full potential.

"FASD lasts a lifetime, there is no cure and it is 100 percent preventable. The month of September is a great opportunity to appeal to our community and educate our whanau and friends about the importance of abstaining from alcohol during pregnancy."

About 19 percent of women report drinking alcohol at some time in their pregnancy – with the rate higher (28 percent) for women aged 15 to 24-years.

There is no safe time, type or amount of alcohol to drink when pregnant and the best way to prevent FASD, is by staying alcohol-free during pregnancy. It's never too late to stop drinking and pregnant women should talk to their whanau, partner and friends about providing support – for example by also going alcohol-free, by discouraging others from offering alcohol and by making sure there are non-alcoholic drinks provided at social events.

Help is also available from midwives, doctors, nurses and other health professionals, or by calling the Alcohol Drug Helpline on 0800 787 797.

"When someone hears that they, or a loved one, has cancer it is devastating. The impact of a diagnosis can be far-reaching. There are often so many unanswered questions and so much to consider, that it can be overwhelming for everyone involved. "It might be how they will get to hospital, where they will stay during treatment, how they will feed their pet while away from home, or who they can talk to about their cancer."

The Cancer Society offers accommodation close to all major hospitals in NZ for patients and their carers, if their treatment requires frequent hospital visits, but they do not live nearby. During 2017, the Society provided 49,000 bed nights and drove almost 4700 patients to and from their treatment, covering more than one million kilometres.

Outside the Box

Men and Counselling

Today I am looking through our latest statistics for the year ended June 2018.

Our wonderful statistics recording system developed by Angela Coleman (ICT Hub) means I can compare patterns over the years.

Of note this year is the increase in the number of men using the Marton Counselling Centre. This has increased to 38%. A sizeable increase compared to 21% in 2011. This is really good to see. While I can't have a definitive answer to the increase of men seeking our help I think it is due to a number of factors.

Counselling is becoming more acceptable and normal. We have worked hard to break down any stigma about talking to a counsellor. We want talking to a counsellor to be as normal and ordinary as talking to your doctor or dentist or hairdresser.

There has been a huge media focus that it's OK to ask for help. Newspapers, social media, TV and many celebrities are speaking out about issues like depression, anxiety and possible suicidal thoughts.

We work alongside the local medical centres in both Marton and Bulls and 52% of our referrals come to us via the local GPs. A person might mention difficulties to their doctor or their doctor may think their patient would benefit from counselling so, with the patient's permission, we send a referral. We then contact the person for a chat and invite them to come in and meet us.

Clients that have used our services are spreading the word.

Need a Builder?



When you are looking for a builder, it's best to use builders who are guaranteed to be qualified to do the job to the highest standard.

Builders should be a Licensed Building Practitioner.

If you're thinking of having building or renovation work done on your house or apartment, you need to check if it's Restricted Building Work (RBW). If it is, you will need a Licensed Building Practitioner (LBP) to do it.

If your building work is critical to the integrity of your home, it may be restricted building work. This type of work ensures a property is structurally sound and weathertight.

You must use a Licensed Building Practitioner (LBP) to design or carry out restricted building work. An LBP must do or supervise this work.

You also need to ensure your building project is legal, through the local council. This will help avoid potentially costly mistakes or delays and ensure your property is safe, healthy and durable and meets all council crtieria for building standards.

As an LBP, builders keep up to date with changing industry practices and regulatory changes. All LBPs must complete a set of skills maintenance activities every two years to renew their licence. They receive important regulatory and technical information to complete elective activities that are relevant to the work they do.

To find a Registered Master Builder in your area, you can go online, complete the online form and a list will be emailed to you. Master Builders guarantee their work. They run competitions

aiming for top quality contruction, including the House of The Year awards and an Apprentice of the Year - apprentices can enter whether they work for a Registered Master Builder or not and all employers are encouraged to put their best apprentices forward for this competition.

There are also online lists for allied trade organisations like the NZ architects register, IPENZ Engineers NZ - CPEng search, the Plumbers, Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board register and Roofing, Brick and Block, Exterior Plasterers.



Half of NZ apprentices already been to university

Parents and teachers of school leavers, need to start taking careers in trades seriously, as teens are missing out on genuine opportunities to avoid student loans and get ahead.

Fiona Kingsford, CE of industry training organisation Competenz, says while around 60,000 teenagers leave school each year, just 4% go straight into trades training.

"We need to triple that. More than half of our apprentices and trainees have already been to university, or another tertiary institute and many of them have clocked up student debt. But they could have avoided that debt altogether and started an apprenticeship straightaway. "Research shows that because apprentices start earning earlier, they can buy a house earlier and pay off a mortgage earlier, which puts them financially ahead of university graduates for most of their working lives and at about the same financial position, when they're ready to retire. "Our mission is to educate not only school leavers about their opportunitiess but also their parents and careers advisers too."

Competenz works with apprentices and trainees across 36 sectors, including mechanical engineering, one of NZ's biggest growth areas.

Kingsford says: "Infometrics data shows that we'll need 5,500 more workers in the mechanical engineering sector, between now and 2022, to fill new jobs and replace workers who retire, or leave. That's just one sector and with such a small number of school leavers going into the trades, employers are all competing for the same pool of people.

"We need to get more school leavers into trades now or the skills shortage will only get worse. "A lot of the decision-making is aided by parents and family members and a lot of the time, it's what mum and dad know of those industries. But we need our young people to be aware of all the opportunities out there."

Competenz works closely with Apprentice Training NZ (ATNZ), the country's largest employer of mechanical engineering apprentices.

"ATNZ has recruited 105 apprentices this year and still has another 50 apprenticeship vacancies to fill across the country," said Kingsford.

"Auckland employs one third of mechanical engineers and, coupled with strong future population growth, the region still holds good prospects for those entering the sector. That said, rents and house prices are sky rocketing in Auckland, so working in smaller regions allows people to easily relocate and enjoy a higher quality of life.
