

Country music festival here to stay

Hundreds of motorhomes arrived from all over the country to create a village of campers at Marton's James Wilson Park for the 2018 Marton Country Music Festival over Wellington Anniversary Weekend.

The Marton Country Music Festival has become a regular and welcome destination for many country music fans and summer motorhome travellers alike, culminating in over 420 motorhomes parked seven rows deep at Wilson Park and an overall total of 450 camp sites allocated. Some pointed out the central location of the town as the reason they joined the festival, along with the excellent facilities the park and Marton offer.

As a result of the numbers attending, the line up of entertainers on Friday and Saturday nights, was enjoyed by large audiences. Each evening offered young, up and coming guest performers, through to more experienced and familiar country singers. On Saturday night, Brendan Dugan and Dennis Marsh had to wait until close to midnight to perform the finale but the evening started with talented young stars. Fiddler Marian Burns was a big hit with her great talent and enthusiasm. She sang an Anzac song she had written that has been picked up all over the world to celebrate the many WW1, 100-year commemorations happening at present. She took the crowd on a fun ride with her fiddle and a very able backing band.

The two backing bands did an admirable job over the weekend, especially Saturday night's Hired Gunz who had to cope with several impromptu numbers from the big guns. The other hardworking band was Los Vaqueros.

One of the performers pointed out that the festival's fun to be part of because you can simply enjoy it, with no contest and no pressure. Entertainers thanked organiser John De Burgh for inviting them to participate, including well known country star Joni Harms from the USA, who acknowledged Anne George as the founder of the popular event. The Festival is a Marton event and is destined to remain in Marton, according to John de Burgh who was wondering why local people kept asking him if it was going to move. He says he put that subject to bed last year when he took over the organisation of it.

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NZ Cowboy number one aiming for top

Marton teenager and sharpshooter, Bradley McDowell is off to America to represent New Zealand in the Cowboy Action Shooting world champs in Albuquerque, New Mexico in June this year.

Bradley has been cowboy pistol shooting for five years and



has risen to the top of the sport age groups, competing all over NZ and in America. He has a good eye and developed the skill that has led to him reaching number one overall in New Zealand, including senior open grades at the age of 16. Bradley is NZ's youngest men's champion and has the potential to reach his aim of becoming a world champion. The world competition in Albuquerque is his last chance to enter both the age group up to 16 years and the open contest. The strength of the sport is in its youth at the present time. The 16 year age group has the best shooters in the world, with three out of the 10 top shooters in the world, in that age group - not the open section.

About 7800 pistol shooters attend the New Mexico competition. Cowboy Action Shooting is a sport created in California in 1982 and is run under international rules set by 'The Single Action Shooting Society' of the USA. The sport is becoming very popular in NZ.

Bradley lives in Marton and is Y12 student at Whanganui High School and practises with the Wanganui Pistol Club. He is the son of Shaun McDowell, owner of Carey's Joinery in Marton, who is also involved in the sport at

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Fire at Horizons depot

A fire at the Horizons Regional Council depot in Levin overnight last Thursday, caused damage to property, equipment and vehicles. Horizons CE Michael McCartney says Horizons was alerted to the fire in the early hours of Friday morning.

"Emergency services attended the scene, put it out, and are now in the process of determining what was the cause of the fire," he says.

"While there has been considerable damage to property, equipment and vehicles, the main thing is that nobody was hurt.

"We have been in contact with Horowhenua District Council and are working with them to find alternate arrangements for our staff. We realise this will cause a level of business disruption but we will do our best to minimise the impact."

Mr McCartney says a full inventory of what has been damaged will be undertaken.

"At this stage we know some plant and equipment has been destroyed. Fortunately, our boat that undertakes monitoring on Lake Horowhenua was not on site and will be able to continue business as usual."

Horizons has three dedicated staff who work out of the Levin depot and undertake pest control in the district. Staff from across the organisation also use the facility for equipment storage.

Weather outlook

NIWA says January - March 2018 temperatures confidently forecast to be above average, with high confidence for all regions of New Zealand. Coastal water temperatures around New Zealand and further offshore, in the Tasman Sea, are forecast to remain

above average over the next three-month period. For January – March 2018 rainfall totals are most likely to be in the above normal range, in the North Island and about equally likely to be near normal or above normal

in the South Island. January – March 2018 soil moisture levels and river flows are most likely to be near normal in the north of the South Island. For all remaining regions of the country, soil moisture levels and river flows are about equally likely to be in the below normal or near normal range.

Central North Island, Taranaki, Whanganui, Manawatu, Wellington temperatures are very likely to be above average.

Rainfall totals are most likely to be above normal. Soil moisture levels and river flows are about equally likely to be in the below normal range or near normal range.

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Test your children's road safety knowledge before school starts back

As kids head back to school next week, we want parents to take the time to check they're up to speed with road safety.

"The summer holidays are long and that means some children might have forgotten some of the basic rules they need to follow to keep themselves safe," says Inspector Peter McKennie, manager of operations for road policing.

"Add to that their excitement about returning to school and seeing their friends and this can mean they will be less alert to the traffic dangers around them."

Police are asking parents to sit down with their kids before the end of the holidays and have a conversation around road safety rules. This is particularly important if your child is going to be travelling to school on their own.

"Help them to choose the safest route to get there and do a few practise walks or bikes with them so they are familiar with the route and the safest places to cross," says Inspector McKennie.

"It is important to remind them that any time they are crossing the road they must stop, look, and listen for any cars, bikes, or cyclists before they step out."

Police are also urging parents to remember that kids will follow their actions. "If you break the rules – kids will think it is ok to as well and that can put lives in danger. For that reason, we need parents to stick to the road rules. "Try parking a bit further away from school and walking, if there aren't any free parks close by and make sure you don't park on yellow lines.

"For motorists in general, remember to keep your speed down and be extra alert in case a child runs or bikes in front of you, without warning. Even small increases in speed result in a much greater increase in stopping distance and that can mean the difference between life and death for pedestrians, so it's vital to slow down around schools.

"Children make mistakes, but they don't deserve to pay for them with their lives. How you drive makes the difference," says Inspector McKennie. Other safety tips for walking or biking to school include: Young children

should be accompanied by an adult, older child, or a buddy. Discuss the use of crossings and why it's safer to cross at some corners

rather than others. Discuss the meaning of traffic signals and markings along the route.

Teach them to cooperate with police, school safety patrols, and adult crossing guards.

Contact the school and see if there is a walking school bus available. If not, look at setting up one yourself.

Childhood asthma on holiday

Asthma is a common illness in NZ, affecting one in six kiwi kids.

Over the school holidays children are often exposed to many environments, which are different to a normal school week. It can mean that a child is exposed to their

asthma triggers.

Knowing as much as you can about your child's asthma triggers can help you to reduce exposure to them, making your child's asthma easier to handle," says Teresa Demetriou - Asthma and Respiratory Foundation NZ.

"We've put together a list of tips to help your child stay happy and well over the school holidays: before heading away on a holiday or before your child has a sleepover at a friend's house, assess that their asthma is well controlled. Make sure that anywhere your child is staying is cigarette/smokefree. Make sure there are no pets in the living environments if your child is allergic to them. While it is not possible to ensure any space is dust-free, taking their own sleeping bag or other bedding can help reduce a child's exposure and possible symptoms. When heading away, ensure that your child has enough medication and that it is easily accessible.

If your child is being taken care of by another caregiver: ensure that the caregiver is aware of your child's asthma and what to do if their asthma gets worse. It's a good idea to give them a copy of your child's Asthma Action Plan and talk them through using their medication. Ensure that your child feels comfortable enough with the caregiver to ask for assistance if they start to experience any asthma symptoms. Make sure the caregiver is aware of possible activities that may be an issue e.g. pillow fights, hide-and-seek in high pollen areas..

A steady stream of prospective students wanting to study health, beauty, automotive engineering and carpentry seem to be the focus for those enrolling for study at UCOL in 2018.

The Medical Imaging Technology degree is always over-subscribed and is again this year.

Beauty programmes, such as nail technology, are proving popular across the three campuses at both certificate and diploma levels. Similarly, automotive engineering and carpentry programmes are reaching capacity. All students learn in an environment like the one they will experience when they leave the classroom to join industry. This includes, in the case of beauty and hairdressing for example, client days where members of the public can come in and get a treatment, while at the same time helping the students learn.

For people wanting to get into business, information communication technology, or software development, opportunities exist. Likewise hospitality and cookery programmes are always

exist. Likewise hospitality and cookery programmes are always popular.UCOL training restaurants are well supported by members of the public and employment opportunities are high. Creative programmes such as art, design, interior design and photography generally start in March and numbers are building in these programmes.UCOL students and staff regularly win national awards and competitions and have stunning exhibitions throughout the year. A new Bachelor of Creative Media is being launched soon, replacing the Bachelor of Applied Visual Imaging.

Students speak highly of the learning experience offered at UCOL which includes working in environments which simulate real life situations, use of industry equipment and technology, staff who are professionals in their chosen field, and who share their own experiences and knowledge.

Adding to the student experience is UCOL's student services and an employability hub, whanau room and other pastoral care. UCOL is a quality provider and is looking forward to welcoming the 2018 student intake with the upcoming start of the year - kicking off with Orientation in February.

Keep cool without blowing your energy bill

You can keep your home cool without blowing your energy bill, according to state agency EECA ENERGYWISE. Technical expert Allen Davison says more people are using their heat pumps as air conditioners in summer and

there are tactics to avoid big energy bills. For example, using the fan only setting helps you feel cooler by creating a breeze, he says. "This setting uses a

lot less electricity than the full cooling mode. Keep your windows open while using the fan only mode."

S e l e c t i n g th e dehumidifying mode also uses less electricity than the full cooling mode, Mr Davison says. "This works well if it's humidity rather than the temperature that's the problem. Shut your doors and windows in the rooms you're dehumidifying."

Mr Davison suggests only using cooling mode on really hot days when the other methods aren't enough.

"Shut all your doors and windows in the rooms you're cooling. It's best to cool one room as this is what most heat pumps/air conditioners are sized for. Set the thermostat to around 22°C. The room won't cool down any quicker if you set it lower, but you are likely to use more electricity by overcooling."

Avoid using auto settings because if you forget to switch the unit off, it will start heating if the temperature drops below the thermostat setting, he says.

"It's also important to clean the filter of your air conditioner regularly because clogged filters stop the appliance running efficiently."

Use fans like floor and desktop fans are relatively cheap to buy and install, and are much cheaper to run than air conditioning, Mr Davison says.

"They're especially good if you only get a week or two of extremely hot weather during the year."

Close blinds and curtains at windows that receive direct sun provides shade from the hot sun.

For longer term solutions, plant deciduous trees on the north and west sides of your home - they provide shade in summer, but lose their leaves in winter and allow sunlight through. You can also use trellises for growing plants to shade your windows in summer.

Install external window shades - such as blinds, awnings or louvres. They allow you to shade rooms in summer, but let light and heat in at other times of the year. External shading is much more effective than internal shading as it blocks the sun's heat before it gets inside your home.

When building, design eaves (or roof overhangs) above north-facing windows - to stop direct sunlight entering rooms at the height of summer, but allowing direct light in the rest of the year. They won't help you with low-angled morning and afternoon sun from the east and west.



In October, a team of scientists from New Zealand and Finland travelled to Antarctica for a scientific diving expedition under the ice.

Led by NIWA marine ecologist Dr Drew Lohrer, the aim of the expedition was to explore how climate change is affecting the marine biodiversity in Antarctica. A unique combination of species and isolation has provided an area largely unaffected by human activity.

The divers found that there have been surprisingly big changes in the coastal seafloor communities in just a few years.


"What used to be a very stable, sparse and food-deprived animal community on the seafloor, under the thick ice in New Harbour, is now much richer, with more species and higher densities of animals," Dr Lohrer said.

New Harbour sea ice can go for years without breaking out, and this multiyear ice can grow up to 4.5 metres thick. When the ice is thick, very little light can penetrate the ice to fuel primary production (for example algae) and therefore food supply to the animals on the seafloor is limited.

The rich community now observed is most likely a rapid response to the sea ice breaking out two years in a row, resulting in more light and higher productivity in the ecosystem.

While under the ice, divers captured spectacular images of the creatures they saw which they will use for further study.

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Tragic drowning of local student

A Marton Samoan family and school friends are in mourning after the drowning of 16-year-old Rangitikei College student Valentino Laki who had only been living in New Zealand for nine months with his adopted family. Ateliana Laki said she had adopted the teen, Valentino, from Samoa and he had only been living in New Zealand for nine months.

He disappeared in the Rangitikei River near the SH1 Bulls Bridge when the family had gone to the river to cool off on Sunday afternoon. He had been in the water for about half an hour before he got into trouble around 5.30pm. River flows increased slightly after rainfall upstream. Sadly, he could not swim, according to his mother.

The family called police just before 6pm and a search and rescue operation was launched. More than 40 members of the public and several cars were also at the scene on Sunday along with family members, a local jet boater and a rescue helicopter. They searched until the early hours; resuming on Monday morning. The body of the 16-year-old was recovered from the river, near Bulls, on Monday about 3pm.

CNZ Police Inspector David White says, "The Police National Dive Squad recovered a body from the Rangitikei River near Bulls. The body was recovered from the river at around 3pm near the SH 1 Bulls Bridge, close to where the swimmer was last seen on Sunday. Police's thoughts and sympathies are with the boy's family and we are supporting them at this time. The matter will be referred to the Coroner.

A rahui has been placed on the relevant section of the Rangitikei River by local iwi until further notice.

Rangitikei College principal Tony Booker offered condolences to the Laki family and says "It is with great sadness that our school community has learned of the tragic death of Valentino Laki whilst swimming last Sunday. "Valentino joined our school in July last year and was a friendly and cheerful character, always smiling, and he was adapting well to his new environment. He loved his rugby, was fast and skilful, and highly rated by his team. His death is a tragedy and we are all hurting."

Valentino's funeral will be held on Friday at the Marton Memorial Hall.



Female shearer Kerri-Jo Te Huia completed what has been described as an 'epic sporting feat' when she set the world shearing record in a nine-hour slog. Kerri-Jo is from a well-known former Rangitikei shearing family and joins her brother Stacey who also holds a shearing world record.

On Monday, Kerri-Jo shore 452 ewes at Otapawa Station, Tiraumea (east of Eketahuna) in Wairarapa, with brother Stacey Te Huia in support, to set a new record for the women's nine-hour strongwool ewe category.

Kerri-Jo, now from Te Kuiti, targeted the record for the most ewes shorn by a woman in a nine-hour-day under the rules of the World Sheep Shearing Records Society. She started at 5am and ended with 452 at the end of the 9 hour day.

There was currently no up to date record for the feat. Shearers present say Ms Te Huia had created a formidable world record, setting a tough challenge for up-and-coming female shearers.

Maureen Hyatt shore 522 ewes in the Southland 25 years ago, in a record which was in 1983, dispatched to a closed register after a restructuring of shearing record rules.

They have very little time to make the judgement call to pull off SH3 (to the left, where there is almost no shoulder) and so allow traffic to pass, or to pull into the right lane and force following traffic to the left. Street lighting for the southern entrance would help at night. It has been promised, but is yet to be installed.

I understand over 30 valley residents petitioned Transit (road transport agency) to put in a safer entrance to the valley. Unfortunately, the proposal to create a better situated entrance to the valley wasn't picked up by Transit because it wasn't deemed a necessary priority because (as I understand) no one has died there in the past 5 years. Many of us were disappointed by Transit's decision not to provide a new entrance to the valley. Certainly, some of our concerns were addressed in response by way of improvements to the northern entrance but till today the southern entrance is still a hazard. I believe the area is still unsafe and I worry if will it be me, my husband, one of my children, or a neighbour, that has to be killed before something is done to make it safer. I hope something can be done as soon as possible to ensure we live to have a happy new year! Anna Boerboom, Whangaehu.



Welcome rains lift spirits in New outlook tower at Mt Stewart drought-affected region

The significant rainfall in parts of the drought-affected North Island in the past couple of weeks has come just in time for many farmers and brought hope that the rural communities may have "dodged a bullet".

However, the rain was variable with some localised thunderstorms. Some farmers are still experiencing real hardship and feeling more frustrated when they miss rain that seems to fall all around, but not on, their farm.

To the west of the main divide, many areas received 60mm or more rain in early January, but areas along the coast received considerably less and remained worst-affected by the early drought. In Tararua, up to 100mm fell in the driest areas around Pahiatua, while Dannevirke and Norsewood received 35mm. The NZ Drought Index and NIWA hotspot atch show a huge difference in soil moisture compared to the past weeks. "In terms of soil moisture, if followed up with regular rainfalls, this could have been the drought-breaker we were all hoping for," says James Stewart, deputy chair of the Rural Coordination Group.

"Droughts, however, are slow to build up and slow to recover from. While the impacts of the relentless early summer dry are continuing to affect farmers here, we are hopeful that their drought plans have held them in good stead so they can recover as quickly as possible."

Due to the early hot dry summer, farmers had been unable to make and save much supplementary feed for later, or have been using their winter feed already. Some dairy farmers have needed to dry off or cull cows early, and bought in extra supplements. Identifying the longer-term impacts and planning for all the possibilities to get through winter will be crucial.

The cohesive Manawatu-Whanganui (Horizons region) Rural Coordination Group made up of Rural Support Trusts, Ministry for Primary Industries, Civil Defence Emergency Management and representatives from Federated Farmers, Dairy NZ, Beef + Lamb NZ, and Fonterra, has been meeting regularly to monitor the situation and how farmers in the region are managin and what help and support can be offered. "We have resource for farmers who want support managing their feed budgets or understanding their options. They should call the local Rural Support Trust on 0800 RURAL HELP (0800 787 254) for a chat," says Mr Stewart.

"Federated Farmers has also activated its Feedline on its website, open to both members and non-members who want to request or offer feed. Plus there will be a range of community events to get people off farm, share ideas about what farmers can do in the current situation, and provide some relief from the daily pressures." A new Mt Stewart summit lookout tower was formally presented to the town of Taihape by Friends of Mt Stewart Society and opened by Mayor Andy Watson on 21 December 2017. It was named the Les Thurston Tower in honour of the local who donated hundreds of hours clearing the native reserve of weeds. Mr Thurston was

present the event but unaware that the tower was to be named after him until it was unveiled. Friends of Mt Stewart Society brought the community together to fundraise to build the new tower on Mt Stewart Reserve. The total cost is unknown at this stage, but many people have donated either their time, their business goods or made a financial contribution. Taihape Rotary originally built the iconic summit lookout tower on Mt Stewart Reserve in 1981 as a community service

project. On 10 April 2013, a fire swept up the northern face of the reserve leaving the lookout tower condemned. Friends of Mt Stewart was formed in 2003 as an independent voluntary society to maintain the native forest on the Mt Stewart Reserve. The committee undertook to build a new summit lookout tower, with Taihape Rotary's support.

Over 28 local businesses and individuals contributed generously in varying ways, to help Friends of Mt Stewart achieve their very worthy goal for the community.

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


