Wandersearch Tracking Former pupils **System**

What is it?

The WanderSearch tracking system is used by Land Search and Rescue and NZ Police (Colin Wright, NZ Police and OC of Whanganui Search and Rescue) to search for people living with dementia or autism who have walked from their place of residence.

How does it work?

A pendant is worn by the person. The pendant emits a pulse, using a specific frequency which is detected using a radio tracking unit and a directional finding aerial. The pulse strengthens as the tracking unit approaches the pendant.

How much does it cost?

Mazda Foundation NZ funded the pendants and the tracking equipment. We ask that you become a member of Alzheimers Whanganui (\$25 per annum) and pay for the battery replacement – (\$60 every 6 months).

A meet and greet at Rangitikei College on Saturday afternoon attracted a group of former pupils from the schools' early days. They were mostly 1960s pupils from the region, a few from the South Island and one from Brisbane.

They joined tours of the college, lead by current principal Tony Booker and caught up with old friends and old pupils. Rex Millar (pictured speaking to visitors) was instrumental in encouraging people to mark the 60th anniversary of the college opened in 1958 along with Paul and Anne Donaldson. The prinicpal also welcomed visitors along with former pupil Mayor Andy Watson. Groups also caught up for lunch and dinner in Marton.



When I made the decision to contest the Rangitikei seat in May 2011, a few of my friends told me they thought I wouldn't like what I found when I got to Parliament. Well, I can safely say, for the

most part, they were wrong.

I have met and worked alongside many wonderful MPs, from both sides of the House. I appreciate some people may feel annoyed and even a somewhat affronted by events over recent weeks, which National Party leader Simon Bridges, deputy Paula Bennett and president Peter Goodfellow have had to deal with unfortunately very publicly. I understand this sideshow may have caused doubt, even amongst some of our most ardent supporters. However, it's important to remember it was created by a previous member of the National Caucus, and it was clearly an attempt to undermine our leadership team and the significant work we are doing as a strong, effective and united Opposition team.

The worst aspect of this whole saga is that the expelled member of our Caucus was previously a trusted Parliamentary Whip, which makes the betrayal of our party and Members of Parliament even more treacherous. Party Whips are traditionally the keepers of all secrets; they know stuff about their parliamentary colleagues that no one else does; they have a job which, to be effective, demands complete trust, integrity

I said at the start that I have enjoyed most of my time as the MP for Rangitikei. The past month has probably been the most difficult for me. I certainly didn't come to Parliament to play personality politics. I entered national politics following a successful nine year run as the Mayor of Manawatu, with a strong will to serve the people and interests of our region at a local and also at a national level.

I was born and bred in the Rangitikei and I am passionate about our proud history and promising future.

It was originally opened in 1927, by the then Prime Minister JG Coates and was considered the most up to date post office in the Dominion at that time. It closed in 1980.

To the parents of Marton

Tonight at 6.45, I pulled into my driveway, coming home from work. I live only a kilometre from my job but the amount of work I carry home with me each night, at this time of year, makes the car important. I am a teacher. Today, I arrived home 11 hours after I left this morning. I have left work but brought home exams to mark and reports to write. This is my life and it does not bother me, I chose to be a teacher and it is a rewarding career.

I knew, coming into this profession, that my hours would be long and my holidays short, although the world thinks that this is the other way around. I often hear "you are so lucky to have so many holidays, I only get 4 weeks."

Those same people look at me funny when I ask them how many days they go into work during their holidays or how much work they take home with them, to do at home while on break. School may be out for those two weeks that students are so excited about, but more often than not, this teacher is in. Either reorganising the classroom, or preparing resources for the coming term, marking, catching up on administration (they do not tell you about all the red tape at Teachers' College), sometimes even travelling to a 3-day conference of professional development and I am not the only one. That does not bother me, I knew when I became a teacher that I would need to be prepared to put in a lot more hours than 9am to 3pm, Monday to Friday.

Like many other teachers, I am also studying, so, I also have to carve out time for professional readings and to write assignments, as well as travelling to courses. I like this. I share this with my students, so they see that I am still learning and know the struggle they have, trying to balance school and life. I want them to be lifelong learners. It makes sense then that I would still be learning. Again, this does not bother me, I chose to study while teaching.

Like other parents and teachers, I try to support every fundraiser that my students do. I buy products that I have no

need for and re-gift them later. I buy chocolates, baking, pies and a variety of other edibles and re-gift them too. In my career I have sponsored students to go on camps, I have fundraised for class trips that I do not get to go on, for students I do not teach, in subjects not my own. This does not bother me. I know that the benefits, to both the student and the school, from these camps and trips are far-reaching and worth every little thing I can do to help.

camps and trips are far-reaching and worth every little thing I can do to help. Like other teachers, I stock up of stationery. I always have students who forget to bring their book or their pen. I hoard magazines and journals to try to encourage reading. I support and encourage my learners in as many ways as I can think of, to try to level their playing field.

Sometimes it is enough. This does not bother me. It is a part of teaching..

What does bother me is, every time when our contract negotiation rolls around, teachers are suddenly portrayed as evil, money hungry monsters, endangering the educational wellbeing of your children. The government makes a big show of offering, what on the surface, appears to be, a good offer. The headlines are full of talks of money, but nothing is said of the toxic conditions hidden under the table - conditions designed to make teaching harder, to bury us in more administration work, to take away from our value in the classroom, by increasing class sizes. Ultimately, if we strike, the government sits back and smirks because they know, from experience, that in a strike, teachers do not always have the support of the community, especially if the community only hears about the money.

I did not become a teacher for the salary. You become a teacher for love, not money. However, I also did not become a teacher to be constantly barraged by a government telling me I am not worth it. I became a teacher to be a part of helping young adults realise their worth in a world that does not always recognise it.

So, what I really want parents of my learners to know, is that, if we strike, we are not striking for the money. We strike because your child, that you have given to us for 6 ½ hours a day to teach, is worth it. Helping them reach their potential, is worth it. Making sure that they receive the best education we can give them, is worth it. Opening up opportunities for them, is worth it. Most of all - they are worth it. I will not let any government tell them differently!

Mix of summer messages at Marton's Holiday Safety Day

Water safety, responsible drinking and keeping safe in the sun are some of many summer safety messages being promoted at Marton's Holiday Safety Day, early next month.

These important summer messages will be the subjects of public talks and stalls taking place on Friday 7 December (10am to 2pm) at Memorial Hall, Wellington Rd, which lead organiser and Plunket community support coordinator Heidi Wright says local agencies are keen to be part of.

Along with experts presenting advice on how to stay safe during summer, there will be talks on dog safety, fire safety, skin safety and very importantly - safety around rivers and pools.

"Water safety is one of the key messages of the day," says Rangitikei Health Centre public health nurse Marilyn Archibald. "The number of river drownings in our region is high so it's important to get the swim safely message out there. A total of 105 people drowned in Aotearoa last year and tragically, there have been river and beach drownings in our district during the last four years. This is going to be a hot summer so we want swimmers to take care.

"Responsible drinking as well as vehicle safety are also timely messages with the festive season just around the corner.

"We'll have information about road safety, bicycle safety, driver's licence requirements and the importance of safe use of children's car seats. We also want to make people aware of the dangers of backing vehicles in driveways and the risks of not always being able to see children in the rear view mirror." Another focus of the day is safe infant sleeping which coincides with the 7 December National Safe Sleep Day dedicated to raise awareness about Sudden Unexpected Death in Infants (SUDI). To mark National Safe Sleep Day, representatives from Whanganui Regional Health Network will be onsite promoting Pepi Pods and Wahakura (made of woven flax) plus sharing other tips for safe infant sleeping.

A 'water only' refreshment stand and free sausage sizzle will be onsite at the Marton Memorial Hall for the Holiday Safety Day. Groups taking part in the event include: Whanganui District Health Board, Te Kotuku Hauora, Plunket Society, Surf Lifesaving NZ, NZ Police, Rangitikei District Council, Horizons Road Safety, Whanganui Regional Health Network, Cancer Society Sun Safety, Southern Rangitikei Vet Services, Whanganui Quit Clinic (Smokefree), NZ Fire Service and St John Ambulance.

RANGITKERURAL Focus on farming and the land

Aiming for high performance, low footprint farms

Through a new DairyNZ project, Canterbury dairy farmers will lead the way in showcasing how nitrogen (N) losses can continue to be reduced in order to protect local waterways. Dairy farmers nationwide will be able to follow the project, called Meeting a Sustainable Future, which will focus on how farmers in Hinds and Selwyn can meet N loss limits and maintain profitable businesses under the Canterbury Land & Water Regional Plan (LWRP).

The project will build on sustainable farming initiatives many farmers have already begun and an official launch event is being held on a Canterbury dairy farm on Wednesday, December 5.

Under the LWRP, Selwyn farmers must reduce N losses by 30 percent by 2022 and in Hinds by 15 percent by 2025, 25 percent by 2030 and 36 percent by 2035.

DairyNZ project leader Virginia Serra says the limits are challenging, but the sector is committed to helping farmers achieve them while maintaining resilient businesses.

"This project builds on previous N loss research. It aims to give farmers confidence the limits are achievable," said Virginia. "Many farmers have been making changes to reduce N loss for some time and this will continue to build on that."

The project will be launched at Farm Systems of the Future field day on a Canterbury dairy farm on December 5. The event will explore the host farmer's high performance and lower footprint and how other farmers are adjusting their systems to reduce footprint profitably.

The Meeting a Sustainable Future project will initially involve a few partner farms making changes to reduce N loss and tracking the impact.


Floats, fun and a lolly scramble

Mangaweka School celebrates 125 years in March next year

The Three Log Whare public school as it was originally known opened on 5 March 1894 with a roll of 23. The school daybook notes by teacher Mr Thomas Bowden mentions the absence of books and slates and tables and chairs. The roll gradually grew, despite fluctuations, reaching a grand peak of 136 in 1969.

Celebrations will also recognise the now closed schools in the area, including;

-Potaka Road School opened in 1917 on land donated by the Mckinnon family at the junction of Potaka and Toe Toe Roads.
-Lower Kawhatau School was opened to accommodate the children from the Timaru re-settlement scheme - 34 children from eight families attended school there in 1896.
-Records are scarce from Manui School which was situated near the junction of SH 1 and Manui Rd, it was open in 1903.

-Makohine Valley School was situated 9 miles south from Mangaweka. Mr Muirhead who taught school there in 1916 boarded

with Samuel and Harriet Dickinson and their eight children, an orphaned niece and an aged grandfather.

- Kawhatau Valley - Pourangaki School was situated on three separate sites in the valley, each providing the need for schooling and following the settlers as they moved further up the valley. Opened in 1904 the school served the community well, finally closing in 1985.

-Mangaweka Convent was open from 1918 to 1935. It was situated near to the current site of St Patricks Church and staffed by the sisters of St Joseph from Wanganui.

Many children from those schools also attended Mangaweka School.

It is not unusual for second and third generation children to attend the Mangaweka districts schools, with some of them having family members who also taught at one or more of the local schools.

The 125 Reunion Programme from 1 to 3 March 2019, will include tree planting and cake cutting celebrations, with plenty of time over lunch and dinner on the Saturday to socialise and catch up with old friends. 

HUNTLEY SCHOOL CLAIMS NATIONAL TITLE

Marton's Huntley School has claimed the 2018 New Zealand title for intermediate schoolboy cricket - the NZC National Primary School Cup - undefeated (against big-name schools from the cities) - the only unbeaten team. Also impressive was that it was Huntley School's fourth consecutive year representing CDCA at the nationals and this time they went all the way. After Auckland's St Kentigern had won both their opening matches as well, and with Tauranga Intermediate and final round opponents Breen's, both capable of overtaking them if they lost, it was all on in the fifth and last round in Lincoln, after wet weather had washed out rounds three and four the day before. St Kentigern had entered the last morning in the box seat, equal on points with Huntley but with a massive net run rate advantage However, the Auckland lads went down to Wellington's Raroa Normal and that left Huntley just needing to win for the title. They had set Breen's a good chase of 160, however, with just 4.1 overs to go in the crunch T20 and the Marton lads were up against it. Breen's middle order was blasting away above the required run rate, with a 50-run stand, for the fourth wicket, posted off just 32 balls. But the very next ball, with his final delivery of the over, allrounder Matthew Florence broke the threatening stand and it set in motion a dramatic flurry of wickets that sealed the title. Harry McVerry struck with all three of his first three deliveries of the next over, to claim the hat-trick, then dotted down with his fourth delivery before striking again to win the match. All five of his wickets were bowled and McVerry finished with a brilliant 5-10 off just 2.5 overs, which also swept him to the top of the wicket-takers for the national tourmanent, with seven wickets. Huntley opening batsman Matthew Hocquard, was meanwhile the runaway top run-scorer at this year's Cup, with 243 runs from his three matches, including an unbeaten 72 off 59 balls, to help set up the big total against Breen's. He had shared a 110-run opening stand witr Florence in the final game - Florence reaching a half century off 49 balls. A brilliant result for Huntley School, and a great reflection of all the hard work, training, belief and planning that has gone in behind the scenes from all involved. Huntley winning team captain Monty Sherriff says, "It was definitely fun, it's more than the cricket, it's about making friends, meeting new people. It's a great experience and one we will never forget." Team coach Anton Buys adds, "NZ Cricket do an amazing job of looking after us for 3 days - everything is taken care of. We get to play on first class cricket grounds and the standard of competition was very high." Headmaster Sam Edwards says, "The way they played on the field and conducted themselves off the field made us all very proud. For a small school like us to foot it with the big intermediate schools in the country is just outstanding.

DHB calls for responsible drinking this festive season

With the summer festive season around the corner, Whanganui District Health Board is encouraging people to drink alcohol responsibly. WDHB alcohol and other drugs health promotion officer Chester Penaflor is urging people to actively encourage their friends and family to drink moderately and to accept that it's not OK to pressure someone to have another drink. "Show support and back your friends who are trying to ease up on the drink this summer," Mr Penaflor says. "If you know someone who is trying to reduce their drinking, please support them. It is socially acceptable to say 'no more' and to not be pressured to have 'another one'. To reduce long-term health risks associated with alcohol, the current recommendation is no more than two standard drinks a day for women, no more than three standard drinks for men, and to have at least two alcohol-free days a week.

"Meanwhile, in pregnancy, there's no safe time, type, or amount of alcohol to drink - that's the message for pregnant women, their partners and their families, who have an important role to play in supporting alcohol-free pregnancies. It falls upon all of us to look after the health of our babies-to-be. The safe-drinking message is also relevant for older and younger Whanganui district residents. Special thought is needed for older adults who tend to experience worse side-effects from alcohol use and for those under 18 years old for whom no alcohol is still the safest option," Mr Penaflor says. "Another important point to remember is: when supplying alcohol to those under the age of 18, you need to obtain consent from that person's parent/legal guardian, or you might find yourself paying up to \$2000 in fines. "When it comes to having a good time, use simple harm reduction tools, such as drinking water in between drinks, or choosing low-alcohol drinks. It helps you enjoy the occasion - and remember it. If you find it hard to stop drinking or to cut back, talk to someone you trust or call the Alcohol Drug Helpline on 0800 787 797."


