

Local musicians shine at Rockquest

Smokefree Rockquest founder and director Glenn Common says there are more bands than ever reaching the high standard required of national finalists. "This means that real dedication

is required to achieve the stand out quality that the judges will be looking for", he said. "They have to capture 15 minutes of their original material on video for selection as national finalists. It's a process that demands creativity and musical ability - being able to work together as a group and having good organizational skills. What separates them out is perseverance – industry success seldom happens overnight."

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National Party leader Simon Bridges hosted a function at the Lourie family's Orlando Country Club on the outskirts of Palmerston North last

week, as part of his 'Connecting with Communities' tour. There were over 250 people there and it was a fantastic atmosphere with plenty of lively discussion and a great question and answer session.

There were a number of topics raised during the course of the evening including the bail laws, midwives, the Manawatu Gorge, mental health issues and of course, M. bovis.

I thought it might be timely to comment on the latter, so here's my take on where we're at with M. bovis.

As it stands, almost 40 farms are infected and there are around 300 under Notice of Direction. Last week, the government announced its plan to implement a phased eradication programme to rid NZ of M Bovis within the next 10 years. I believe it was the right decision.

The full cost of the programme is projected at \$886 million. Of this, \$16 million is for loss of production and will be borne by farmers, while \$870 million is the cost of the response, including farmer compensation. The government will meet 68% of this cost - DairyNZ and Beef+Lamb NZ are responsible for the remaining 32 per cent.

Even though it's a 10 year eradication programme, most of the work will be done in the first two years and that makes sense. In the first instance, this action means culling another 126,000 + cows, following on from the 22,000 already culled It's important to note that the alternative option was to accept M. bovis and instead, come up with a long-term management plan. It's estimated that this would have cost the dairy and beef industries 1.3 billion in lost production over the next 10 years, not to mention ongoing productivity losses across our farming sector.

Together the dairy and sheep and beef industries are New Zealand's single biggest export earner by far - and NZ needs them to keep our economy going. To do nothing and to stare down the barrel of over \$1 billion in lost production over the next 10 years, would be disastrous; not just for our farmers and rural and provincial NZ but for everyone from agri-supply stores to local contractors, rural schools and small business owners to processors, bankers, lawyers and accountants. Its effects would certainly spread far and wide.

Last week's decision, of phased eradication over two years, will bring a significant level of certainty to farmers and businesses around the country. I'm pleased a decision has finally been made and that an agreement has also been struck to share the costs of this response between industry and

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government.

M.bovis has caused enormous stress and anxiety for farming families. The financial and emotional toll on farmers has been significant, so it's reassuring to see the government has responded to pressure to speed up the compensation process and will now make interim payments within two weeks of stock being culled. The fact everyone now has a clear pathway forward, on an issue that is bigger than politics, is great. While we can't be sure the strategy will work, it certainly beats not even trying.

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Abatement notice served following contamination

Horizons Regional Council has served the New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) with an abatement notice to cease the unauthorised discharge of contaminants at Ohakea Air Base. Horizons group manager strategy and regulation Dr Nic Peet says NZDF must cease the unauthorised discharge of a contaminant, namely stormwater that contains Aqueous Fire Fighting Foam (AFFF), onto or into land in circumstances where it may enter water.

NZDF must also cease the unauthorised discharge of a contaminant, namely AFFF into the stormwater network associated with wash down and flushing of the fire truck foam system equipment, which may enter water.

Finally, NZDF must cease the unauthorised discharge of a contaminant, namely AFFF from the fire training area onto or into land where it may enter water.

"We have required NZDF to comply with the notice and report to us what measures have been put in place to do so by 1 July 2018," says Dr Peet.

"In the meantime, Horizons' investigation into the discharge of contaminants in and around Ohakea Air Base continues."



Bulls groundwater tests

Cr Graeme Platt moved that Rangitikei District Council investigate the feasibility of an independent test of the Bulls water by a recognised agency.

He said, "We need to know where we stand. "

The BUlls ward councillor was referring to circumstances that came about since the Defence Force found contamination in soil and ground water surrounding Ohakea Base. The firefighting foam contaminates are a newly identified problem at airports all over the world including NZ. Cr Platt says knowledge of PFASS is evolving overseas.

Mayor Andy Watson said it's undesirable to have any chemicals in the water supply although the Ministry of Health says there is no reason for people not to use the Bulls water supply."

Long term health problems have been highlighted if high levels of AFFFs are present at certain levels.

CE Ross McNeil agreed to ask advice on the cost and benefits of doing ndependant tests.

Cr McManaway said he believed it was not the council place to do the tests and that RDC should keep out of it.

St John in Schools programme at James Cook

The ASB St John in Schools programme was launched at James Cook School on Monday, involving pupils of all ages. It is an educational programme that teaches Kiwi kids to recognise emergency situations and know how to respond;, emphasises the importance of knowing where their household phone or parents' mobiles are located and understand how to dial 111.

Community educators visit schools across NZ, to provide young people with the skills and confidence to act in response to an emergency situation. The programme values children of all ages and recognises their ability to make a difference in an emergency.

What happens in a typical ASB St John in Schools session? In consultation with the school, a trained community educator will plan and deliver the programme to a class, or group of classes, at school, in response to a request from a teacher or school administrator.

St John's experienced educators have excellent classroom skills and child friendly teaching resources – they know how to make the experience fun and interactive for every child.

St John currently has the following modules on offer in the central region - Responding to an Emergency and Injury Prevention.

Within both these modules they have different levels available to cater to all different age groups and learning abilities. Each of the sessions is usually between 45-90 minutes long per class. The ASB St John in Schools programme provides learning for students that relate to the subjects of health and physical education and science in the school curriculum.

Earlier this year, St John also launched a song that teaches children how to phone 111 in an emergency. The '111 Ambulance Song' has taken Kiwi kids and parents by storm. The song presents a fun way to convey an important message for Kiwi kids. Director of community programmes, Sarah Manley, hopes the popularity of the '111 Ambulance Song' will encourage parents to talk to their kids about what to do in an emergency.

"Teaching children this step-by-step guide might seem simplistic but there is no doubt that this can and will help to save lives. We know that in an emergency, every second counts and by teaching our little ones the basics, it can help equip them to deal with potentially daunting situations," Ms Manley said. The '111 Ambulance Song' was written by NZ children's songwriter and author Chris Sanders and produced by Silver Scroll winner Rikki Morris. The song is available for download on iTunes and Google Play for \$2.39, with fifty percent of proceeds from every download going towards St John NZ, the country's most trusted charity.

ASB provides national sponsorship for the programme, alongside ACC, enabling it to be delivered to schools with just a gold coin donation sought, where possible, from each participant, to help meet the full cost of administration and delivery.

According to the latest St John annual report, 32,902 children have participate so far, in the ASB St John in Schools programme in the central region.

FROM THE PULPIT

Justified

Thinking about what to write for this column, I got the word 'justified.'

Looking in the Bible I find the word 'justified'. I also find 'just' (as in acting, or done in accordance with what is morally right, or proper; not as in 'just now' or 'just a minute' etc). There's also justice, justification, justifier, justifieth, justify, justifying and justly. In fact there are 198 scriptures using these words, depending on which version of the Bible you read. There is one scripture including the word 'injustice' in the KJV and six in the Living Bible. There are 17 scriptures containing the words 'unjust' or 'unjustly'.

The Concise Oxford Dictionary explains 'justify' as: show the justness, or rightness of (person, act, etc); demonstrate correctness of (assertion etc); adduce adequate grounds for (conduct, claim etc); vindicate (of circumstances) be such as to justify; (in) just, right (am justified in assuming : (Theol.) declare (person) free from penalty of sin on

; (Theol.) declare (person) free from penalty of sin on ground of Christ's righteousness or the infusion of grace. The Dictionary explains 'injustice' as, lack of equity, unfairness; unjust act; do person an injustice, judge unfairly.

I think about a motto used by the Free Australia Party and adopted by many Australian bikers. 'When Injustice Becomes Law, Resistance Becomes Duty'.

As we read the scriptures, we see God is all about justice and His plan to justify mankind from sin. We also see God's abhorrence to injustice and the unjust. The Bible also shows us blessing for just (right) living and cursing for injustice. So, to line up with God's plan to be justified, we have to turn from and resist injustice and accept the justification, or freedom from sin, through Christ's righteousness and grace. Rom. Ch.3 vs 21-26. But now a righteousness from God, apart from law, has been made known, to which the law and the prophets testify. This righteousness from God comes through faith in Jesus Christ to all who believe. There is no difference, for all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God and are justified freely by His grace through the redemption that came by Jesus Christ.

God presented Him as a sacrifice of atonement, through faith in His blood. He did this to demonstrate His justice, because, in His forbearance, He had left the sins committed beforehand unpunished - He did it to demonstrate justice at the present time, so as to be just and the one who justifies those who have faith in Jesus.



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Farmers should engage in Zero Carbon Bill consultation

Climate change ambassadors for the dairy sector are encouraging all dairy farmers to engage with the government during the consultation period of the Zero Carbon Bill, which runs for six weeks.

"Later this year, when the bill is introduced into Parliament, it will be very difficult to make any substantial changes," says Northland farmer Andrew Booth. "Now is our chance to get the farmer voice heard by the people drafting this legislation."

"It's really important that farmers engage now and fully understand the intent of the legislation."

DairyNZ is running regional workshops throughout June for dairy farmers about why agricultural emissions need to be addressed, as well as covering the development of the Zero Carbon Bill.

"These workshops aren't an opportunity to debate climate change," says Taranaki farmer Trish Rankin. "They are an opportunity to understand climate change and hear about what we can do to play our part.

"The environmental work farmers up and down the country are doing right now is already helping to reduce greenhouse gas emissions but we want to stay proactive and engaged on this journey."

"All of us in the agricultural sector should be aware of the outcome this Bill is trying to achieve," says Canterbury farmer Theona Blom.

"We know that dairy farmers, as well as the entire agricultural sector, have a significant role to play in helping lower biological emissions."

Biological emissions, methane and nitrous oxide from the dairy sector, make up 22.5 percent of NZ's emissions and nearly half of all the agricultural sectors emissions.

"Everyone needs to think about their environmental footprint," says Bay of Plenty farmer Fraser McGougan. "Collectively every little bit of change each of us can make will help on this journey.




