Plenty pedal for pleasure

Marton Rotary's Pedal 4 Pleasure cycling event held last Sunday, was a great success; attracting over 100 cyclists of all ages.

It was the second time the ride has been held and it's now destined to become an annual event.

Participants cycled the Tutaenui area of the Rangitikei in beautiful, almost windless, autumn weather.

There were three courses each designed for the fitness, age and determination of the participants.

The longest course was 80km and involved a number of hills. Fewer hills and only 40km was the next course, while 15km, with only gentle hills, was just right for the less able or determined.

A refreshment stop was available and while some chose to ignore it, others made the most of it.

The age of cyclists ranged from 70 down to 2 years,

although the latter were more likely passengers on their parents' bikes.

One family group had a mother with two toddlers in a trailer (listening to music), and an older child riding with them.


Marton Rotary says its very appreciative of the sponsorship provided by many Marton businesses - their generosity meant that every participant who attended the prizegiving received a prize.

Historic Maori Rugby shield challenge game this weekend

The 97 year old Wanganui Maori Rugby challenge shield called the Whenuaroa Shield is set to be reintroduced into the premier Wanganui rugby competition this weekend, when Taihape hosts Ratana in the Wanganui Rugby premiership.

In an effort to reinvigorate the shield challenge, trustees of the descendants who first presented the shield for competition in 1921, have set up an annual challenge fixture between Ratana and Taihape.

The shield was originally played for by sub-union Maori rugby teams affiliated to the Wanganui Rugby Football Union.

Many shield fixtures followed its inception but the results of only 31 annual tournaments were recorded on the trophy. Very few shield games have been played in recent times. Punch Pine, Wilson Winiata and Joe Whenuaroa originally presented the shield to promote Maori rugby in the Wanganui area.

They are descendants of the late Maata Kotahi who ceded her land to the Ahu Whenua Trust which represents 74 owners. The Rangitikei River property, north-east of Taihape; known as Makokomiko Station, is a 2300 ha sheep, beef and deer farm, currently run by three trustees: Warwick Whenuaroa, Phillip Cashell and Simeon Nepe.

The trustees and owners of Makokomiko commissioned recent restoration of the shield, completed by Don Tantrum and decided to create a new competition in appreciation of the significant relationship between Taihape and Ratana. Maata Kotahi was laid to rest at

The new competition will be played once a year at the holder's home ground. The history of the sub-union challenge and rules of the new competition are inscribed on the back of the

The trustees invite family members, as well as the Taihape and Ratana communities to attend the inaugural game of the reinvigorated competition at Taihape Memorial Park this Saturday March 24. Kick-off is at 2.30pm.

Following the match, the shield will be presented to the winning team at the Taihape Rugby clubrooms.

Exceptional Sports Science scholarship success at Rangitikei College

Rangitikei College has shown again that it may be a small rural school but students there are capable of achieving at the very highest academic level. In the 2017 Scholarship results recently released, two Year 13 students from the school passed the prestigious award through their Sports Science course.

Riley Boyle achieved Scholarship, awarded to the top 3% in the country undertaking that course, for her work on 'e-sports and sexism'. And last year's head boy and dux, Jermaine Moke, gained an 'Outstanding Scholarship' for his presentation on the 'place of haka on New Zealand sport'. An 'Outstanding Scholarship' is gained by less than 1% of those who enter and this is the first time any student from Rangitikei College has been awarded this grade.

Rangitikei College has seen ten students achieving Scholarships in Sports Science over the past six years, which is a phenomenal achievement for a school of this size. Their teacher, and Head of Department Aletia Thompson, commented "It's such an awesome opportunity to prove to our learners that they can compete with the best of the best. Doing it so consistently just helps to reinforce that".

Principal Tony Booker was delighted with the results. "This a great achievement that is a credit to the students, and also to their teacher. It goes to show that students at the college have every opportunity to excel on the national stage, and, with the right attitude, they do just that."







Myrtle rust found in Manawatu

Myrtle rust has been detected in Manawatu for the first time, the Ministry for Primary Industries confirmed this week.

The fungus was found on a young ramarama (Lophomyrtus) in a planted area off Victoria Esplanade in Palmerston North. Myrtle Rust Response spokesperson Dr Catherine Duthie says operational activity will start immediately to try to contain the disease.

"Hopefully, we have found it in this region early, which will give us a chance of trying to eliminate it or, at least, slow down the spread there. We are swinging straight into action. The infected plant will be removed and securely disposed of and one of our seven field surveillance teams will begin an intensive inspection of myrtle plants on all properties within a 200 metre radius.

"It is disheartening that myrtle rust has been detected in another region but it is consistent with the expected infection pattern.

"Residents can help, by checking the myrtle plants in their garden. At this time of year, the fungus is still in its sporulation, or spreading, stage. This means it is very visible. Without touching the plant, you can look on either side of the leaves and new shoots, for any sign of a bright yellow, powdery eruption. Some leaves could also be buckled or twisted, or look diseased with dry pustules that are grey or brown. It's really important not to touch the plants or brush against them, as this can disrupt the spores and speed up its spread."

Any suspected cases of myrtle rust can be reported to the Biosecurity Hotline 0800 80 99 66. MPI will investigate suspected cases, track and monitor its spread and collect information to help understand the disease's impact on New Zealand.

At 19 March, there has been a total of 409 properties affected by myrtle rust on mainland New Zealand: Northland (four properties), Auckland (63), Waikato (33), Bay of Plenty (92), Taranaki (200), Manawatu (1) and Wellington (16). In the last couple of weeks, most detections have been in Taranaki and Auckland.

There have been no detections in the South Island to date, although north-western areas were identified in climate modelling as being at a high risk from spores carried on the wind from Australia.

RUSTLING BILL DOES NOT GO FAR ENOUGH

FROM THE PULPIT

We stand on the brink of Easter week, starting with Palm Sunday this Sunday and leading into the Easter weekend, when we remember the events of Jesus' trial, crucifixion and resurrection.

There is no more important time in the calendar for Christians. Even Christmas points ultimately to Easter. In fact, without Easter, Christmas is pointless. The main reason Jesus came to earth, was not so we could tell the Christmas story (wonderful as it is), not to just teach us about the way we should live (although this also is very important), but His main purpose in coming to earth, was to die and be raised from the death. This is the crux of the matter. This is what the Christian gospel is all about. Jesus came to earth in order to take on Himself all our pain, all our suffering and all our hurt. He came to take on Himself all our wrongdoing and all the pain we have caused others. He came for us, He came to give us a full and meaningful life and so we could know God.

In January, I had the privilege of being in Israel. I got to walk where Jesus walked, to visit the places where many of the events of Jesus' time on earth took place. In some ways the trip was disappointing. There our churches have built over many of the sites where it is claimed Jesus did miracles, where he was born, preached and died. I would have preferred to see things as they were 2,000 years ago, but that was a forlorn and unlikely hope.

But one place that I really liked was the alternate site of Jesus' burial. This was a place identified in the 18th century by General Gordon (famous for battles in China and the Sudan). The were no strong claims made that this was the actual site, but it certainly looked the real deal. It was well outside the city wall and next to a cliff face that with a little imagination, looked like a skull (the hill where Jesus was crucified was called the place of the skull). It is a plain tomb site, there is no trace of anyone inside; just a place where a body was once laid but there is a sign that quotes the angel speaking to the women who came to anoint Jesus in Matthew 28: 6 "He is not here; he has risen."

Historians now say that the evidence for Jesus rising from the dead is overwhelming. Yes, he lives and now he invites you to come to Him, to get to know Him.

South Rangitikei Schools' Community of Learning/Kāhui Ako Update

We have now established a leadership team made up of 10 teachers. In term 1, our South Rangitikei Community of Learning/Kahui Ako was able to bring the team together to make progress on what teachers are most interested in doing. They really want to work together to improve outcomes for ALL students across the Rangitikei region.

This means a change from focusing on 'what is in this for me and my school' and looking instead through a lens of 'what can I do to contribute to positive outcomes for all students in the schools in our community.

Our 'within school' teachers will be opening up their classrooms from term 2 and inviting other teachers inside. This is one way of opening up the lines of

communication and collaboration between the ten schools. We continue to ask ourselves: 'what can we do together that is difficult to do on our own'? Everytime we seek answers to that question the potential of our Kāhui Ako

One of the other exciting recent developments is that the Kāhui Ako has been successful in gaining 1000 hours of professional development time to assist our kura to reach the goals we have set in our achievement challenge. (If you would like to view this document, go to your nearest school, they will be happy to share it with you).

These hours are worth hundreds of thousands of dollars!





Positively identify your target, or it could be your mate that you shoot! That's the message of Joe Green, chairman of the Firearms Safety Council Actearoa New Zealand, as the

roar approaches. On average, one deer hunter is killed each year when one hunter has shot another whilst deer hunting; failure to identify the target being a primary factor, says Mr Green. Identifying your target, beyond all doubt, is one of the seven basic rules of safe firearms handling and should be second nature to all hunters. Hunters should sight the head, neck and shoulder of the animal, all at the same time, or at least sufficient of the animal to confirm target identification. "No shooter should ever fire at shape, colour, movement or sound". Beware - under certain circumstances the brain can trick the eyes. Assume any shape, colour, movement, or sound is human, until you can prove otherwise, says Mr Green. Wearing coloured clothing that contrasts with the environment, including deer, can help you be seen by other hunters. Ultimately, the responsibility of target identification lies solely in the hands of the shooter. In most of the incidents causing death and injury, the shooter and the victim were in the same hunting party. They deliberately separated; which became the beginning of a series of factors leading to tragedy. You and your hunting companions should stay together, says Mr Green. If you do separate, then stop hunting until you regain visual contact. Take special care during the roar; comply with all seven basic rules of firearms safety; make sure you positively identify your target beyond all doubt and, if you are hunting with a companion, stay together. The seven basic rules of safe firearms handling are: 1: treat every firearm as loaded. Check every firearm yourself. Pass, or accept, only an open, or unloaded firearm. 2: always point firearms in a safe direction. Loaded or unloaded, always point the muzzle in a safe direction. 3: load a firearm only when you are ready to fire. Load only the magazine after you reach your shooting area. Load the chamber only when ready to shoot. Completely unload before leaving the shooting area. 4: identify your target beyond all doubt. Movement colour, sound and shape can all deceive you. Assume colour, shape, sound, and shape to be human, until

proven otherwise. 5: check your firing zone - think - what may happen if you miss your target? What might you hit between you and the target, or beyond? Do not fire if you know others are in your firing zone. 6: store firearms and amunition safely. When not in use; lock away the bolt, firearm and ammunition separately. Never leave firearms in a vehicle that is unattended. 7: avoid alcohol and drugs when handling firearms. Good judgement is the key to safe use of firearms.
