Rangitikei District Council has appointed Peter Beggs to be its new chief executive for a five-year term, starting 21 October 2019. He will start a week after the Local Government Election after which

chief executive

He will start a week after the Local Government Election after which a new council is due to take office. Beggs was CE of Antarctica NZ from 2013 until he was dismissed in August 2018, after a six-week investigation of his electronic communications revealed misconduct serious enough for him to be fired. He had been operating a private consultancy in Christchurch since.

Mayor Andy Watson has said he is satisfied with the process council undertook before hiring Peter Beggs and says he was asked a lot of searching questions about what happened and the council was completely happy with the situation.

"Peter brings to the Rangitikei an unusually high level of expertise as a chief executive in a number of different sectors. He has proven, dynamic relationship-building skills within the business sector, as well as with community organisations, professional bodies and individuals," says Mayor Watson. "We were impressed by his very clear understanding of the drivers for the Rangitikei and his enthusiasm to lift its profile.

"The Rangitikei District has ahead it of some exciting new challenges, with the building of new community /civic centres, waste water plants and welcoming new businesses to our district. We see the opportunity to achieve a dynamic approach to customer services from the use of new technologies.

"Council sees Peter as being able to succeed in these challenges; we are confident that he will very quickly become a strong and informed advocate for the Rangitikei and redefine and promote the advantages of visiting, living and doing business here."

Mayor Watson also acknowledged the work of the current CE. "In appointing Peter, Council acknowledges the substantial contribution made by Ross McNeil who has been Council's chief executive since March 2013. Ross has laid the foundations for a number of key projects which, when completed, will make a real difference to lives in the Rangitikei."

The public gallery was filled with Bulls supporters and he outlined the history of the land and told council about canvassing Bulls people and the lack of knowledge of the area and the sale. Councillors later made the decision to sell part the land but retain the already mown section for public use.

Historic Mangaweka Bridge

Councillors decided to retain the historic Mangaweka Bridge and support the setting up of a trust to maintain and raise funds for the ongoing maintenance and promotion of the bridge for local tourism. Manawatu District Council also has to make a similar decision, as the bridge spans the boundary between the councils. Cr Richard Aslett said the dollars add up (to keep it) and the public wants it. It makes sense for walking, cycling and tourism potential in front of it.

New loo

Centennial Park will soon sport a bright new public toilet in the rose garden. Councillors moved to spend \$193,353 on installing a much-needed public loo - a new generic RDC design, similar to the recently installed Mangaweka facility. The front will be covered with anti-graffiti covering, decorated with kowhai – the new council symbol. The new toilet will service the many sports people active at Centennial Park and their supporters as well as skatepark users and passersby.

District Plan change

Councillors also moved to appoint an independent commissioner to hear submissions regarding the change to the District Plan - to rezone land to industrial, along SH1 near Marton (between Wings Line and Makirikiri Rd).

Rates questions

Honesty and transparency seem to be in short supply for Horizons chairperson Bruce Gordon, candidate for the Horizons Regional Council

Horizons chairperson Bruce Gordon patted himself on the back last week as he lauded an average 4.88% rate increase, slashed from 5.05% by chopping a \$75,000 freshwater grants programme. This last second unexpected programme cut was initiated by Gordon to the dismay of several councillors.

It is a credit to Horizon staff's integrity that following Gordon's announcement they quickly announced a more transparent picture of the real rate increase.

I live in Feilding and recently received a rate demand from Horizons anticipating about a 5% increase.

I was surprised that the actual increase was well above 5% - in fact over 10% and said he was lucky it was that low! I was shocked to learn that for some Palmerston North

properties, the rate demand increased by more than 14%. If Palmerston North and Feilding have the majority of ratepayers in the region how can the increase average out to 4.88%?

I am currently checking that all legal procedures have taken place correctly and will be getting a legal opinion on to ensure the council got it right.

cervical cancer

protect against

A woman's best protection against developing cervical cancer is to have regular cervical screening.

Kylee Osborne, health promotion officer at the Whanganui DHB Public Health Centre says "all women who have ever been sexually active should have regular cervical screening from the age of 20 up to 70 years.

"Cervical screening, like all screening is not 100 per cent effective, however screening can reduce a woman's risk of developing cervical cancer by 90 per cent."

In the Whanganui region, the "Smear Your Mea" campaign is being supported with free screening during the month of September, which is also Cervical Screening Awareness Month.

Every Monday in September, between 5pm and 6.30pm, the Outpatients department at Whanganui Hospital will provide free cervical screening. No appointment needed.

.The National Cervical Screening Programme recommends that women screen every 3 years as the best way of finding and treating abnormal cell changes and preventing cervical cancer. Women who have previously had abnormal results may need to be screened more regularly.

If you're unsure about when you last had your cervical smear, contact your family doctor or practice nurse.

Rangitikei Forest & Bird Update

At our August meeting members were entertained by a delightful Vet Student from Massey University who spoke about her life experiences. Annie Page lives life to the full and working with birds is her passion. She grew up on the Otago Peninsula and has taken the opportunity to go to the sub Antarctic islands, has been on Peter Blake's boat doing ocean research and earned a place in a team of vets spending time in Rhodesia removing horns from rhinos. As a wildlife guide on the Otago Peninsula, Annie spent many hours with royal albatross and through her brilliant photography, she showed us the various stages of their life cycle. Fly strike is a big problem for these birds so prevention is a major task. Once an albatross is ready to take flight it jumps off the cliff edge as their wings are too long and heavy for a normal take off. They then spend 7 years at sea before returning home to Otago to breed with their life-long partner. Sea lions and yellow eyed penguins also came under Annie's guidance and we learned of the poor hatching rate and chick survival of these penguins. This month we shall be hearing from Tom Kay, who will be discussing his work using drones for monitoring the quality of river habitats. We meet next Wednesday, 11 September, at 7.30pm in the Milne Room.

Shed owners, volunteers and Marton Lions Club members gathered in Broadway before a dinner to thank participants of the Men's Shed tour.

Earlier this year Marton Lions hosted their second tour of Men's Sheds in the district.

Why Hire an Arborist?

What's your Superpower?

There's been a big swing in movies lately, redoing the old comic bookss where heroes have superpowers. I remember these from my childhood and how cool they were.

I wonder what we would consider our own superpower to be. Do you believe you have an ability that is unique and special?

My experience has been that humans are so multi-layered and busy that we sometimes lose the ability to take stock and appreciate just how unique and special we really are.

I ask my clients, "What do you dislike about yourself?" then - "What do you like about yourself?" Often the answer to the first question flows immediately but the second question can be followed by silence and obvious discomfort. Do we think we are being conceited to state our good qualities out loud...or do we just not see it?

If I then ask, "What would your best friend say were your good qualities?" I usually get a response and visible relaxation.

Why? Because the client is not stating their own opinion. I wonder why we can't see our strengths ourselves?

It's called mind-set. Mind-set is cultivation of a positive self-image that supports a person to be and achieve at their optimum.

Part of this is to believe that we are worth the effort. If we don't believe we are worth it, we keep ourselves from developing the mind-set that will make us feel worth it!

How about we make this start? Tell yourself that your superpower is being 'the awesome person that you already are'!

Along with forestry, being an arborist is considered one of the most dangerous jobs there is. An arborist needs to be highly skilled and qualified to work at heights well above 100 feet... with a chainsaw.

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Arborists are aware whether a tree is dead, dying or a possible health and safety risk. They know the correct techniques to use when; removing limbs, assessing diseased or insect ridden limbs, or pruning for aesthetic reasons.

If tree removal or pruning is required, please ensure that the person carrying out the work is well equipped with all the certified protective equipment required - helmet with visor, chainsaw pants or chaps, steel cap boots and a good sharp chainsaw... A lot of accidents happen due to the chainsaw not being sharp!

Spending money to employ an expert is the safest thing to do. Next time you are tempted to 'have a go' yourself, contemplate calling Beaver Trees. We would be more than happy to help!

District Plan Change

On 22 August 2019, Council gave formal public notification of its proposal to rezone approximately 217ha of rural land near Marton, as industrial. This follows a period of informal public feedback in July. The area affected by the zone change lies between Wings Line, State Highway One, Makirikiri Road and the Main Trunk Railway. Submissions close 5pm on Monday 23 September 2019. A commissioner will be appointed to consider all submissions and expert evidence.

Proposed new Marton Civic Centre

Council received a further update from WSP Opus on the proposed relocation of the administration building and Marton Library into the three heritage buildings on High Street/Broadway, Marton – Cobbler/Davenport/Abraham & Williams. More work needs to be done to finalise the various design options and clarify external funding sources, particularly for retention of heritage features.

Proposed amendment to Stock Droving and Grazing Bylaw

Council approved consultation on a proposed amendment to the Stock Droving and Grazing Bylaw which would clarify that grazing of road reserves outside any property is limited to the immediate adjoining property owner (unless that property owner, or Council agrees otherwise). Details, including how to make a submission, are on Council's website, and at the Marton Council office and libraries in Taihape, Marton and Bulls.

Johnson Street/Walker Crescent Block, Bulls

The Public Forum, at the start of the August Council meeting, included the presentation of a petition with 273 signatures from people asking the Council to stop the sale of any part of the block of land between Johnson Street and Walker Crescent (known locally as Haylock Park) for residential development; and for the Council to undertake further consultation with the residents of Bulls. Later in the meeting, Council considered the circumstances by which the land had come into Council ownership (including its legal position), as well as the previous consultation about the proposed sale of properties which Council owned in Bulls (to help fund the new Community Centre on Criterion Street) and town-planning considerations (i.e. the need for recreation/green belt areas in Bulls). The Council was satisfied the proposed sale of part of the block was lawful and had been well signalled to the community over a number of years, and so decided that the area available for sale will be 1.6143ha with the balance of 3,124m2 being retained for public use (which is roughly the same land area as the existing mown part of the block).

Mangaweka Bridge

Following consideration of a report from the Roading Manager, Council resolved to retain the existing Mangaweka Bridge as a walking and cycling facility (a decision mirrored by the Manawatu District Council) and to support the setting up of a Trust to raise funds to contribute to its ongoing maintenance and promotion.

Proposed new facilities on Taihape Memorial Park

Council has accepted a Memorandum of Understanding negotiated with Clubs Taihape as the basis for proceeding with this project, both in terms of design and of finding external funding. It is hoped construction can start in June 2020.

New toilets at Centennial Park, Marton

Council has approved the construction of a Permaloo prefabricated toilet block at Centennial Park, near the rose garden. The toilet will be installed in March 2020, and is the same design as the Mangaweka toilets, it will have two unisex units with disabled access, and a vinyl wrap-around featuring the Council's brand.

New Bulls Community Centre

Work on the new Centre is steadily progressing. Highlights during the past month include ducting for water supply and power across Criterion Street; progress with exterior wall framing and sheathing for all floors; and progress on the internal stairway. Quotes are being sought for the town square, car park, bus lanes and bus parks.

New Chief Executive

Council has appointed Peter Beggs to be the new Chief Executive. Peter starts on Monday 21 October 2019. In making this decision, Council acknowledged the substantial contribution to the Council and the District by Ross McNeil during his term as Council's Chief Executive, 2013-2019.
