

Off to help Child Rescue in Cambodia

Education professionals vote on strike

Learning Support specialists employed directly by the Ministry of Education, began a secret, online vote on Wednesday, over whether to strike for a day on Tuesday August 21.

Affected specialists include psychologists, speech language therapists, early intervention teachers and other professionals who provide specialist, itinerant support to the increasing number of children with the highest learning needs in schools and ECE centres.

Last week, NZEI members voted almost unanimously to move to a secret ballot. Online voting closes next Monday at 6pm.

NZÈI Te Riu Roa national executive member Byron Sanders is on the negotiation team and said members felt insulted and demoralised when an offer was finally tabled.

"Our members' caseloads are overwhelming. We need something tangible from the Ministry to reduce our workload and an improved pay offer," he said.

The Ministry has offered a 2% pay increase, on the day of ratification and a further 2% on September 1, 2019.

The M.Ed employs about 850 Learning Support specialists.

School holidays might be a time for teenagers to chill out, play games, catch up with family and maybe even catch up on school work but four local secondary students will spend their next holiday learning a new culture, language and broadening their horizons by visiting Cambodia.

Rangitikei College maths teacher, Anthony John, has organised the overseas excursion, leaving September 27 and returning October 15. Along with the Marton students, there are three teenagers from Palmerston North and a parent making the trip. The main purpose of the expedition, for the group of nine, is to assist an organisation called Child Rescue NZ.

For some students, this will be their first time overseas, or even on a plane.

The group is still fundraising, so if you have any work, or project that you need help with and can contribute to the fund, please contact Rangitikei College on 06 327 7024. Child Rescue NZ is a branch of Destiny Rescue

International, a recognised Christian non-profit organisation, dedicated to rescuing children trapped in the sex trade. As part of the trip,

Mr John and his team are fundraising to help build toilets and showers for the Grace Centre, a make-shift orphanage for boys in Kampong Cham. The local students will also do a mural and help with a farm project for Child Rescue. Mr John has been to Cambodia several times and he wants to share his experiences with

the students, as well as assisting worthwhile organisations.

Students to Benefit from Charitable Eye Screening Programme

Under a charitable initiative, more than 400 children from selected Rangitikei and Manawatu schools will be screened for undiagnosed eye conditions this month.

Essilor Vision Foundation, a NZ registered charity, hopes to screen more than 3000 decile one and two primary and intermediate aged school students throughout the country, this year.

Around 4000 children were vision screened over the last two years with almost a third of them found to have a range of eyesight conditions. This raises concerns among experts that there could be thousands more struggling to see clearly.

The charity's work continues this month at James Cook School, along with five in Manawatu. Yesterday, the Foundation and volunteers from Palmerston North optometry practices, Visique Naylor Palmer and Visique Eyespy, began conducting screening of the students with specialised equipment.

Optometrist Maile Tarsau from Visique Eyespy says she expects a number of school children she examines to present with vision issues similar to those in other parts of the country.

"The data gathered by the Foundation from the screenings in schools around NZ over recent years, consistently found that one in three children has an issue with their vision that requires intervention from an optometrist.

"The work of the charity has made a real difference in the lives of thousands of these low decile school children who were living with undiagnosed vision conditions.

"Sadly, it is possible that some of these children can be mislabelled as 'disruptive' or showed reduced performance, when they simply couldn't see what the teacher was writing at the front of the class and became discouraged and disengaged," she says.

Cherie Southall from Visique Naylor Palmer says a study by Massey University education researchers suggests correcting a child's vision can make a real difference to their lives.

"We know that around 80% of a student's learning occurs through their eyes and something as simple as a pair of corrective lenses can improve their quality of life on many levels, The Foundation arranges a special ceremony where children who need prescription lenses

receive them in front of their school, teachers and parents. The charity is also seeking support to expand their screening programme throughout other

Southern pilgrimage benefits regions

Kiwibank economists say an inter-generational transition is taking place in New Zealand. Baby boomers are retiring and unlocking their landlocked wealth in the form of subdivision before cashing up and moving to the regions.

Chief economist for Kiwibank Jarrod Kerr says: "Once the kids have flown the coop, the need for a backyard diminishes. We're seeing Auckland boomers leaving in droves for the cheaper regions. The exodus has boosted the housing markets in Northland, Manawatū-Whanganui, Waikato and Hawke's Bay."

But it is not just the baby boomers seeking a change. Younger Aucklanders, priced out of the local housing market, are also choosing to move.

"There's been a flood of interest from northerners on a southern pilgrimage. House price growth reached 13% in May in Manawatū -Whanganui. Southland is also a part of the country that has shown a little more resilience is sales activity, and house prices lifted 12% in May, compared to 9.5% a year ago," Kerr said.

"Interestingly, these standout regions have some of the highest rental yields, with good old fashioned economic opportunity at work.

"The wind has died down in the City of Sails following a period of phenomenal activity. Auckland housing has been put on ice - diverging from other parts of the country. 'Hot' rental areas now include parts of Gisborne, Rotorua, the Hawke's Bay and Manawatū -Whanganui," he said.


Kerr says the government is gearing up to implement policies targeted at speculators. These policies include tightening the bright-line capital gains test, removing the negative gearing tax loophole and banning foreign purchases of existing stock. "The policies and the uncertainty associated with them, may hamper house price gains over the next few years but we don't expect a major correction.

"For the time being there is a housing shortage and mortgage rates remain low. Unemployment is expected to fall, not rise. Housing corrections are often driven by haemorrhaging households suddenly unemployed or lumped with rampantly rising interest rates. Neither is expected over the next few years. The jobs market will remain tight and the Reserve Bank will keep interest rates relatively low. However, we do predict that mortgage rates will rise from late next year," Kerr said. Also covered in the latest Property Insight by Kiwibank economists:

Three P's of property: population, preference, and policy.. and NZ is painfully undersupplied.

The largest migration boom ever recorded is receding, slowly. New Zealand has a shortage of over 100,000 homes. Supply has not kept pace with demand. Demand is still growing; capacity constraints are being hit and Kiwis need more affordable dwellings.

Policy changes, like capital gains tax, will hinder confidence. But the fundamentals outweigh tweaks to taxes. Kiwibank economists expect property prices to consolidate, before regaining traction into the mid-2020s – aided by income and population growth.



Friends of Taihape Society have teamed up with the Taihape Community Board and the Rangitikei District Council to develop the parks and tracks around the Hautapu River, within Taihape township.

FOT president Don Tantrum says, "Many of the tracks are already there; it's just a matter of linking them all together and building rest area facilities and bridges to showcase our amazing natural scenery which is only two minutes from SH1." It's the idea of Joe Byford and Joe Coogan, to further develop this area, after the Society successfully built the Les Thurston Lookout Tower on Mt Stewart.

Taihape has acres of native bush DOC land very close to its township, which includes stunning redwoods that were planted by its settlers. RDC Parks and Reserves leader Athol Sanson is steering the

The group engaged the professional services of Isthmus Architects from Wellington to develop and put their ideas in a cohesive plan. There are many features which encapsulated by the plan including walking, biking, horse treks, camping, swimming, fishing, and rest stops.

Mayor Andy Watson says "The parties who have put this together have done an amazing job. The vision is brilliant and it's a stunning spot, highlighting the Hautapu

River, its papa cliffs, native forests and the giant redwoods. As a group, they have a track record of doing what they say they will do and can bring the community/businesses together to help with both physical work and funding. I am in full support and will look forward to the opportunity where I can to be part of the working team." The society has finished the design stage and is planning the funding. Local chartered accountant and treasurer of the society Matthew Thomas emphasised the society (formally known as Friends of Mt Stewart) is now registered as a charity and requests if anybody is considering donating to make contact with Viv Tantrum (secretary).

He says, "The community buy in has been remarkable so far. We have already received pledges of support from Makokomiko Station's trustees (who are donating 1000 native trees, propagated from their lands), Joe and Tash Coogan, Wayne Lucas and other specialist contractors offering their services, as well as Don and Conchita Tweeddale who are also very keen to assist." 

Broadway - it was a pretty big job... the big chunk is finished and there are two more stages to do

Broadway stage 1 was certainly a pretty big job. "Pretty much everything had come to the end of its life; the watermain was made of asbestos cement, concrete kerbs and channels were over-loaded with stormwater and falling to bits, the road and footpath were in need of resurfacing, and installing ultra-fast broadband (UFB) while everything was opened up just made

sense," says Rangitkei District Council CE Ross McNeil. Maintaining access, to keep businesses functioning while everything was in bits was a tall order. The final piece of work left to finish is to hotmix the road from kerb to kerb. This is expected to take about a week and will involve lifting lids. which is a bit time consuming. The paving operation should be completed over 2-3 days.

The objective is to have the road finished for Market Day in November.

Stage 2 links the work completed with stage 1 at Signal Street, to the new water reticulation at Lambert Street. This work is needed for the same reasons as stage 1. This section is much shorter and has fewer services in the footpath. The connection points for the large watermain at each end are ready for joining onto, and there is one business in the block

that will be affected; Marton Panel and Paint. By comparison to stage 1, stage 2 is not as complicated.

However, urban construction always has some sort of surprise, ready to be discovered by a contractor. This work is planned to be finished before Christmas.

Stage 3 will then address the Follett Street roundabout. Out of the three stages, this is the most complicated to renew the water reticulation. The issues in this short section are; finding sufficient gaps to thread the new 300 diameter pipework between the existing power and telecommunications cables, gas supply and stormwater pipes, while not disturbing the existing fragile water reticulation and preserving the roundabout. Maintaining a space for traffic around the roundabout will be particularly challenging. This work is planned to start late January-early February 2019. The final part of the project is resurfacing of the road, which will be about 12 months after the pipework is finished, to allow time




