### unanimously renamed after 150 years

Marton looked back with pride at the town's history last Saturday, during 150-year naming celebrations held at Marton Memorial Hall.

Early in the day, a re-enactment was held of the 1869 public meeting when locals heard the proposed name for the first time and voted to use it. Descendants of early Marton families played the roles of the naming committee.

A letter posted in 1868 to Henry Lyon, Tutaenui, was re-delivered after 151 years, on horseback, to the original recipient's great grandson, Rod Lyon. Susanna Brice rode a horse to the front door of the Memorial Hall to deliver the mail. Susanna is a 6th generation Martonian descended from the Milne, Hammond, Poppe, Twig and Whale families.

Geoff Follett, descended from the early Follett and Signal families, was MC for the reenactment. Richard Lyon, a 5th generation Martonian, took the part of his forebear Henry who announced the name at the 1869 meeting. Humphrey Calkin acted as Thomas Lambert, an architect and builder, who was tasked with finding a suitable name, along with Henry Lyon. Humphrey is descended from two Marton mayors, Edwin Humphrey(1897) and Ted Calkin (1960 -70s). District mayor Andy Watson played the part of meeting chairman, William Henderson and Liz Rayner played secretary, Mrs Henderson; reciting the meeting minutes that led to the renaming decision. The large crowd at the re-enactment was invited to vote for, or against the motion to call the town Marton. They were unanimous in reaffirming the name.

Afterwards, a celebration cake was cut by Gwen Nielsen, the oldest surviving foundation member of the Marton and District Historical Society. The cake was made by Maree Mullins who is a descendant of early German settlers, the Nitschke and Natschke families.

Mayor Watson thanked the Historical Society, especially Maureen Velvin, for all its work and thanked those who stepped in to help when extra

Marton Lions Club helped with set up, security and clean up and Project Marton arranged the display stalls and many other details. Marton Players arranged the re-enactment and Marton Maori Wardens acted as security.

Stall displays provided a fascinating snapshot of Marton's history and included those of St Stephen's Church, Marton Fire Brigade, Marton Freemasons Lodge, Rural Women, Marton RSA, Marton Players, St Martin Lutheran Church, Bulls Museum, Francis Wilson (meccano), Rangititkei Geneology Group and several extensive displays by the Marton & District Historical Society.

Veteran and vintage cars and vehicles were on display outside the hall and a large number of visitors took the chance to see the Marton Historical Village's permanent collection.

During the day, former Rangitikei mayor and architectural historian John Vickers, led tours of High St and Broadway

# Your vote counts





If you haven't posted your voting papers by now, you should probably take them to the RDC offices.

The RDC website says voting closes at midday this Saturday, 12 October.

Council offices at 46 High St, Marton and Hautapu St, Taihape will remain open until midday this Saturday, 12 October- for anyone needing to do a special vote or drop off their voting documents.

If you haven't enrolled to vote, or have moved within the last three years and didn't receive your voting documents it's not too late to update your details – you can do this online at www. vote.nz or by phoning 0800 36 76 56. Anyone needing special voting documents can phone Council on 0800 422 522.

It's important you have your say and vote before midday on Saturday, 12 October.

Counting will begin and interim results will be posted on the day. Between October 17-27, final results will be posted.

As of 12 noon on Wednesday the following votes were in:

Central Ward - possible 5282 votes : 1686 = 31.92 %Southern Ward - possible 2368 votes : 700 = 26.43%Northern Ward - possible 2367 votes : 624 = 26.36 %

If you are deciding whether or not to vote, consider that the water that comes out of your tap is the responsibility of Council along with organising rubbish collection and disposing of wastewater. Without the work of council, the district would be in a real mess. They ensure a home is well built and the district's roads are maintained.

The district needs good leadership so your vote counts and means more to you personally than national elections. Have your say.

Former Wanganui musician Andrew London, along with Wayne Mason, Laura Collins and Rob Joass are all well-seasoned musicians who tour their own bands nationally. Coming together in Too Many Chiefs, to celebrate song-writing and share stories from the many roads they've travelled, they bring a heady musical blend of influences and styles, ranging from blues and jazz to country and folk, all infused



with an element of social commentary, personal reflection and occasional gentle satire. There's quite a lot of between-song mickey-taking.

#### **Haylock Park**

As a past (town) councillor and held the portfolio, at one stage, for roads and footpaths etc, under the watchful eye of the then chair Dr Owen Haylock, I would be remiss to not make mention of what Dr Owen Haylock's intention was when putting a large sum of money towards securing this extra land in question, in conjunction with the councils purchase. Because the portfolio that I had and we both agreed on progress in Bulls, I was told by Owen of what his intentions were. Owen and I were very concerned at the time of all the land in Bulls that was landlocked by certain people creating a huge number of dead end streets. Unfortunately the council at the time and years gone by made some bad decisions in not securing certain sections for road access when the opportunity arose. The section of land that Dr Owen Haylock purchased was extra land with the proviso that certain streets could be linked up plus a portion to be used as a green area. To carry out his wishes at that time was not an opportune time as the demand was not there because of other sections in town were still available. It is to be remembered that it makes sense to try and subdivide where our services are and not extend them to the outskirts of our town. I signed the petition that was presented to me and congratulate the organizer Bruce Dear for the work that he put into it. My reason for signing is that I felt the public were confused and hoped that this would make the council come out with a clear picture of what the developer plans actually were. In conclusion, the Bulls community owe a huge gratitude to this learned, hardworking gentleman, Dr Owen Haylock, who worked tirelessly for our community that we live in today.

Unfortunately, the Mayor seems to be ungrateful and trivialises the generous donation from Dr Haylock to allow the council of the day to purchase the green area named Haylock Park. Refer in Viewpoint, District Monitor, dated September 26, 2019.

In his piece, he states that "Dr Haylock did provide funding for part of the purchase of Haylock Park – not all of it."

This appears to suggest that it formed a small portion towards the purchase price of the three properties that now form Haylock Park. His generous donation formed the larger portion, in fact 78.4%, of the purchase price and the council of the day provided the balance as they were aware of the future need of suitable green area for when the town developed in that area.

It should be noted that, in explaining to the residents of Bulls when doing the petition and the survey, I have made them aware that the council also contributed approximately \$10,000.

At the council meeting, Thursday 26 September, 2019, Cr G Platt tabled the legal opinion he had received and had been emailed to the now ex CE Ross McNeil, from lawyers engaged in Wellington. Due to an administrative error it was not included in the initial Late Items but now show on the minutes of that meeting as Late Item- Haylock Park. You can view this on the council website, www.rangitikei.govt.nz - look under Meetings. Both Cr Platt and Cr Sheridan both repeatedly asked for a copy of the legal opinion that the council sought and that ex CE Ross McNeil spoke of, at the council meeting on 29 August 2019 but it appears that both the mayor and acting chief executive are withholding this opinion while a legal review takes place. As the councillors would have taken the word of the ex chief executive as part of their consideration, that the council had sought legal advise and that they were legally entitled to sell part of Haylock Park, then this opinion should be readily available in hard copy. I feel like it takes too long to get answers to the questions asked.

#### O'Connor: I'm listening on freshwater

In the past few weeks, I've attended meetings about the Government's freshwater proposals and visited farms around the country.

I understand change of any kind can be scary, but people should be a little cynical about some of the misrepresentation taking place. Despite what some might say, the Government doesn't "hate" farmers and we're not interested in destroying rural communities. That kind of "them v us" talk isn't helping farming families.

We are interested in improving freshwater quality, something farmers and urban Kiwis agree is necessary. Doing so will help protect our farmers' international reputation for sustainably produced food and fibre and safeguard excellent commodity prices. At the meetings, I've heard and respect farmers' concerns about proposed nitrate limits, fencing and other issues in the water proposals. There is work to do after submissions close and I'd expect changes.

I've been accused of not mentioning the good work farmers do. Rubbish. Since starting as minister, I've proudly and regularly praised work including riparian planting, protecting wetlands, tree planting, fencing and limiting fertiliser use. Those things are happening now and not hurting farmers' bottom line.

I've spoken many times about the need for change in urban centres - the often disgusting state of Auckland's beaches is a prime example. However, I'm committed to meaningful baseline targets for things like nitrate levels in rivers - in urban and rural NZ - because that is a social, economic and environmental imperative.

The targets that we finally settle on as part of the proposals will be met over time. I want to see change over a generation and for it to be part of the good work already happening. Rural communities will talk with regional councils about the timeframe for achieving targets.

To put the nitrate target in perspective, there are many catchments

where rivers are about or near the suggested level. There are others which will require greater effort, but I'm confident we can adapt by using best practice and technology to get there.

Last week, I visited several farms that have made environmental changes that did not hurt their bottom line. These things are being done, but we shouldn't ignore that in some places improvements are required.

I reject that the Government is doing nothing to help farmers. The Government set aside \$229 million to spend on things like boosting advisory and extension services and the establishment of local groups so farmers can learn from each other about what works.

I'm talking to Beef and Lamb, Dairy NZ, and others about integrated farm plans to lessen workload. We're investing tens of millions of dollars in tools like Overseer to help farmers.

A Farm Debt Mediation scheme will be a safety net for farmers and improvements to NAIT will help prevent some of the tracing issues we've experienced with Mycoplasma bovis. Soon we will release an industry-backed plan to ensure the sector gets the skilled workers it needs.

We've nearly doubled the funding for rural support trusts and

the Budget had \$1.9 billion for mental health to improve frontline services, rural communities included.

Recently an independent survey found that the "urban/rural divide" is not the issue some make out. People in cities are grateful and supportive of farmers' work. Please be proud and talk to people about what you're doing.

I understand farmers' concerns, but I know that good work is happening and I'm confident that by working together we can improve water quality over time.



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

#### Kirkin' o' the Tartan at Turakina



St Andrew's Turakina Presbyterian Church is holding a Kirkin 'o' The Tartan service on Sunday October 13 at 2pm and invites everyone who enjoys wearing the tartan or is of Scottish descent or lwho oves the culture, to attend. This tradition was started by the Rev Peter Marshall in New York in the 1940s to raise funds for the British

war relief during World War 2. The Rev Marshall was originally from Coatbridge in Scotland.

Stories abound of the Kirkin's roots being in days of the British Act of Proscription when the wearing of the kilt was banned in the Highlands, small pieces of Tartan were brought to church to be secretly blessed so SUnday's celebration is in fact, a centuries old Scottish tradition.

All are invited to bring out your piece of tartan and join the ceremony in Turakina.

This year the Blenheim Bag Pipes (pictured) are to be played. They arrived in NZ in 1840 on the Barque Blenheim and belonged to Donald Cameron of Ockle Ardnamurchan Scotland. Donald was 16 when he arrived in NZ and was known as Donald the Piper. The Pipes were played on the Blenheim and the passengers would dance to them up on deck when it wasn't stormy. The Pipes have been passed down along his and other Cameron families over the past 179 years. On the barque Blenheim, were some Wanganui early settlers - Capt Moses and Jessie Campbell, John Cameron of the Marangai, George Ross, Turakina settlers were Big John and Janet Cameron and family, Donald (Bane- Cooper) and Mary Cameron and family, Alexander and Mary Grant & family, Alexander (Sandy) MacDonald, Gregor and Catherine McGregor, Jane McLachlan and family, Donald McQuarrie. Other Rangitikei settlers were Donald Ferguson and family, Duncan and Marjory Fraser and family, William and Janet Nicol.

#### Choosing the better part

There is a well known event in the Gospel where Jesus Our Lord visits the home of two sisters, Martha and Mary. We read that Martha got busy with the practicalities of hosting their Guest, while Mary sat down to hear what the Lord had to say.

The point of the Lord saying that Mary had "chosen the better part" is not so much that human activity, especially good and necessary human activity, is not important, but that the motivation and the goal of all that activity is much more important.

#### Mystery \$5000 donation has delighted staff at Whanganui Hospital

An anonymous donation arrived in the form of a cheque last month with instructions that the money should go to the hospital's Art and Archives Group.

"We are extremely grateful for this generous gift," said Whanganui District Health Board CE Russell Simpson."And we will make sure it is put to good use by our Art and Archives

While the DHB is always working to keep people well in their homes, there are times when people need to come to the hospital and it can be a difficult and daunting experience. Staff are always looking for ways to make it more friendly and welcoming.

The Art and Archives Group uses art and archival material (including photography and interpretation panels) to improve people's experience of the hospital.

"Artwork is carefully chosen for each setting to help humanise the otherwise large and clinical corridors and spaces, anchoring the place in the district and community and to reflect the outside environment."

Research has found using local art, images of nature, light and potted plants can improve the experience for people in a healthcare situation.

The group recently ran a public photo competition which attracted more than 200 entries, and is preparing a number of submitted images to go on the walls of the corridor that serves the therapy departments. It was also involved in an archival display for Whanganui's

Future plans include the development of a "memory hub" in the Assessment, Treatment & Rehabilitation Ward, displaying 16 black-and-white photographs of Whanganui between the 1920s to 1960s. The hope is these prints will be of interest to patients, family/whānau and staff and may also stimulate memories for patients suffering memory loss.


Connelly Cottage, High St. Bulls. James Bull built this cottage in 1862-1863 for Alick Cockburn, a bootmaker. It's been suggested that in the early days it may have been used by the armed constabulary, as musket shells were found under the floor boards. All the rooms have sloping ceilings and colonial windows. The original hearth opened up to five feet in width and is still in place, behind the present fireplace. There have been various owners and various alterations in the ensuing years. In 1931, Mr Albert and Mrs Connelly bought the property and they raised 6 boys and 2 girls in this house. 

Last week National outlined a number of proposed changes to the Arms Legislation Bill which had its first reading in the House last week and has been sent to the Finance and Expenditure Select Committee for consideration. I am a member of that select committee and I'm looking forward to hearing the many submissions.

MP for Rangitikei In April of this year National supported the Arms (Prohibited firearms, magazines and parts) Amendment Act, which banned all assault rifles and was introduced following the tragic Christchurch shootings.

The Arms Legislation Bill represents the second stage of gun reforms. According to the notes accompanying the Bill, it aims "to improve public safety by adjusting legislative frameworks to impose tighter controls on the use and possession of arms". It would appear the Government has unduly focused responsibility and regulation on law abiding gun owners and hasn't done enough to address access to guns by gangs and those involved in criminal activity.

As a party we would like to see some changes, before considering our support of this piece of legislation and we have proposed a number of reforms.

In the weekend, I attended the annual Sika Show and Competition, which was held at the Great Lake Centre in Taupo. It is the largest hunting focused show and also the biggest outdoor trade show of its kind in NZ. More than 6000 hunters visited the show over two days for the competitions, taxidermy, and latest innovations in hunting and outdoor-related products and services.

I was there with a few National Party colleagues including Brett Hudson, Todd McClay, Louise Upston, Barbara Kuriger and Andrew Bayly to get feedback on the changes we have laid out as requirements for our support of the latest tranche of firearms reforms.

Our ideas are sensible and pragmatic and there was a lot of support for them from those at the Sika Show. Conversations highlighted other issues within the Bill too. It is feedback that will be especially valuable for all of us on the select committee. The general consensus was that firearms owners are worried the Government is trying to drive a wedge between them and non-firearms users. They are fearful that these reforms are a stepping stone to further squeezing of their hunting, sport and recreation activities. They feel the reforms are being done to them, rather than with them

Everyone raised concerns that the Bill is adding regulation, responsibility and cost on people who already obey the law, while doing nothing of substance to combat genuine criminal and gang activity.

The Government has the opportunity to work with us to deliver an amended Bill which will address criminal behaviour and help keep the public safe, while not overburdening those who already follow the rules. This will allow delivery on the purpose of the Bill, while at the same time, ensuring consensus between firearm-owners and non-owners.

The weekend show was busy and it was impossible to ignore the sentiments of the recreational hunters in attendance who clearly feel completely disaffected by proposed further changes to the Arms legislation. We stand ready to do what is right and to work with the Government to do so with broad consensus.

## Streamlined temporary work visa process is a real positive

Federated Farmers is confident the simpler and streamlined temporary work visa process announced by the government will deliver for the regions.

"Our message that workforce and related problems experienced by the big cities are not necessarily those experienced in the provinces has been taken on board - we congratulate the government," Feds employment spokesperson Chris Lewis says.

"The changes will help ensure farmers and others can more easily employ migrants when they need them, and when the options for taking on and training suitable New Zealanders are exhausted."

By ditching the ANZSCO skill level classifications, there is much greater scope for a migrant worker to achieve career progression on our farms.

"The changes incentivise farmers to invest in training and supporting migrant employees, because there's a greater chance of keeping them than currently exists. "We also acknowledge the government for its

compassionate and pragmatic approach in reinstating the family entitlement for lower skilled visa holders. The migrant worker's children can be educated here, and their partner can get an open work visa," Lewis said.

"It's a positive for rural communities to have settled and content families, not just single men who may well be sending all their money home to their family."

The government has indicated the dairy industry is a likely early target group for one of the new sector agreements, containing specific terms and conditions for recruiting foreign workers.

"Federated Farmers looks forward to working with other Team Ag partners and the government to help get this sector agreement right," Lewis said.



# New fishing season off to a flying start reports Fish and Game NZ

Despite cool weather, thousands of keen anglers around the country have been enjoying success as they try to catch a trout for the family dinner table, following the opening of the new freshwater fishing season. The 2019-20 season began on Tuesday October 1, with lakes, streams and rivers re-opening after being closed over winter to allow trout to complete their breeding season undisturbed. The new fishing season coincided with the school holidays and Fish & Game has been encouraging parents to take their children fishing as great holiday activity. Reports from Fish and Game's 12 regions indicate good success for many anglers. In the North Island, Rotorua's reputation for quality trout fishing has been reinforced, with two year-old fish averaging 1.45 kg and 500mm. Lake Okataina, which always produces some good trout, didn't disappoint either, with an average of 1.65kg and 507mm. In the Wellington region, all the rivers look great as far as water flow goes. The fish have fared well too, with stable spawning conditions and several settled months to put condition back on, after the rigorous spawning period. "All in all, the season is shaping up to be a superb one, with our monitoring work showing very good numbers of trout holding in lower North Island waters," Wellington Fish & Game manager Phil Teal says.
